FEW STRIKES ARE NOW FEARED

Labor Unions Make Contracts Which
Seem Just to Both Parties

Despite threatened strikes on part
of street car and other employees of
San Francisco and the recent damag-
ing strikes in Portland, the present
labor outlook is encouraging, both
for employee and employer.

The opening of the out-of-door con-
struction season finds New York,
both city and state, without appre-
hension of serious labor troubles. In
the building trades, especially pros-
perous and reassuring conditions are
prevalent. There is a large and well-
met demand for both skilled and un-
skilled labor, due to the extensive
private construction projects now
under way and the tunnels and other
undertakings of public or semi-public
nature. This contentment is gener-
ally reflected in the manufacturing
and industrial centers, and beyond a
few localized and sporadic strikes,
the labor situation is regarded as
brighter than for many years.

Citizens Boom Rich State and
Secure Great Results

Notes from Portland Tell of Progress
and What Should be Done to Still
Further Advance Interests of
this Richest of all States

The newspapers of no other state
in the Union give more space with-
out cost to advertising the state at
large, and especially their local com-
munity, than do the newspapers of
Oregon. A striking instance has
been the keeping before the people
all the time in local and editorial no-
tice, the colonist rates, giving all the
people in the state an opportunity to
write the facts to their friends, and
this of itself, added very considerably
to the number of new citizens who
are now in Oregon to stay.

The fruit crop of Oregon, during
the coming season promises to be es-
pecially large, and as a result of the
freezing weather in the middle West,
the market will be active and prices
high, bringing Oregon's fruit grow-
ing capabilities to the front in a
most forceful manner.

Portland, during the month of Ap-
ril, will exceed, by more than five
million dollars, the building record
of any other month in the history of
the city.

Oregon has again been honored
through the appointment of Mr.
Isaac A. Manning, who has been ac-
tive in the work of the Portland
Commercial Club and the Oregon De-
velopment League in advertising
Oregon. Mr. Manning goes to Car-
tagena, Columbia, South America,
and he will not overlook an opportu-
nity to extend the trade of this state.

The Portland Business Mens' Ex-
cursion, which will be most thor-
oughly representative of the best bu-
siness interests of the metropolis,
will make stops at thirty-three Ore-
gon and five Utah cities and towns,
and consume six days. They leave
Monday, May 6, at 8:30 a. m., and
return the following morning.

A general meeting of the Oregon
Development League is being discus-
sed for some time in a June, the exact
date as yet not decided upon, at
which a plan will be discussed and
decided upon that will give to the
state of Oregon every possible ad-
vantage that can accrue through
the colonist rates which will begin
September first and close October
thirty-first. The rates are the same
as those which ruled during March
and April and resulted in bringing so
many thousands of people to the
state.

GREAT HARVEST NEAR AT HAVD

Both Settlers and Government Will
Soon Reap Reward

Oregon is on the eve of the first
harvest from the sowing of the re-
clamation service, says the Oregon
Journal. The government soon will
be receiving vast sums in return,
which may be applied to still greater
projects. After years of waiting,
the west is about to realize its great
expectations.

At the present time work is in
progress in reclamation which will
in the very near future bring nearly
a million and a half acres of arid land
under water from government can-
als. From this portion of the total
of 3,198,000 ultimately to be covered
by these projects, the government
will receive annually \$5,372,600 as
the yearly payment of the settlers
who take lands under the ditches and
who must pay the total cost of re-
clamation in ten equal annual sums.
