CALL TO FARMERS

Meeting to be Held in Wasco
June Twenty-first

On this Date Dr. Jas. Withycombe of
The O. A. C., and Others Will Meet
the Farmers and Questions of
Interest Will be Discussed

Dr. James Withycombe will be in Wasco on Friday, June 21, to discuss dry land farming. In the evening he will hold a meeting at the Akers Opera House. All questions pertaining to farming and animal husbandry will be in order for discussion. It is hoped at this time to inaugurate a measure for permanently establishing a Sherman county stock fair in this locality. Other questions of particular interest to farmers will be brought up at this time for discussion.

Dr. Withycombe will be accompanied by Mr. Brian Hunter, special agent from the agricultural department, Washington, D. C., Mr. C. C. Bailey, State Food Commissioner, and also a chemist from the Agricultural College. It is earnestly desired that all farmers and others interested in the development of this section be present at this meeting on the 21st. Expenses have been defrayed by public subscription. Similar meetings will be held in Grass Valley on the 19th and at Moro on the 20th.

FARMERS' UNION GOVERNS PRICES

Effort For Trial Here of Successful
Methods Now On

A movement which C. N. McCaw, of Prescott, Wn., is in Hood River to start, overshadows all other undertakings of the farmers of the Northwest, says the Oregon Journal:

Mr. McCaw is here for no other purpose than to organize the wheat-growers of Oregon in order that they may fix the value of their products on a firm basis and control it themselves. As state organizer for Oregon of the National Farmers Educational and Co-operative Union, and a wheat grower himself, he has already perfected organizations in five wheat districts in this state, the last being at Umatilla, where an association of but 13 members was found that represented a capital of over \$250,000.

The Farmers' Educational and Co-operative union, according to documents in Mr. McCaw's possession, has controlled the cotton situation in the South for the past three years and has been so successful that its president, C. L. Barrett, is now at Vienna, Austria, in conference with the cotton manufacturers of the world making prices of cotton for the present year. Before going Mr. Barrett made a visit to Eastern Oregon and Washington and on his return he will take up the task of organizing the wheat-growers of the Northwest. For the past three years, it is claimed, cotton growers have made their own prices for cotton. To bring about the same result wheat men will pursue the tactics so successfully used by them.

Once organized they will hold their products until a fair price is obtained for them and build their own warehouses to store the grain. Since the inauguration of this union among cotton men crop mortgages are said to have become a thing of the past, and it is claimed they can be eradicated among wheat growers.

What is known as the "sack cinch" among wheat growers and which is said to obtain only in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, which calls for the deduction of one pound of wheat for the weight of each sack, is one of the features which the union will fight to abolish. While this deduction is made against the grower, the shipper and miller are exempt from it and in California, shipping contracts specify that sacks shall weigh as wheat. Wheat growers are also determined to make a fight against the dock age of three fourth of a pound which is charged in Portland, Seattle and Tacoma, saying it is a direct graft and has no foundation but the greed of shippers.

The operations of the union are to be gradually extended to all products of the soil and embrace all organizations that owe their existence to the tilling of it, the ultimate aim being a combine for just prices for the producer and against the manipulation of prices by the trusts.

James Paul, a prominent rancher was drowned in the John Day river in view of his wife, while attempting to ford the stream at flood. He was riding a spirited horse, and his wife, who was also mounted, came to the banks of the stream at a ford with which he was familiar but which appeared so uncommonly dangerous that he deemed it best to try before permitting Mrs. Paul to ride into the water. In mid-stream his wife saw his horse rear and turn backwards, carrying Paul with him. Neither horse nor man reappeared, nor has the body of either been recovered, though search has been constant. Paul was an experienced horseman and accustomed to the streams of this region. It is supposed he threw the horse off his pike by an ungarded pull at his bit.

F. T. Redmond who was formerly principal in our public school has struck another streak of good luck as the following Oregonian article concerning a town which he named for himself will show: "Water was struck in the well being dug on the desert by the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company this morning at a depth of 450 feet. The well is not as yet a gusher, however, in spite of its great depth. The company intends to go deeper. This is the first attempt to secure artesian water in Crook county and the company is highly gratified at its success so far. The well is located near Redmond, whose people are greatly excited over the discovery that water can be secured."

A dispatch to the Oregonian, dated La Grande, June 3d, states that Miller & West, the well-diggers, who found the artesian well in the railroad yards of that city and later left for Riparia, had that day returned to dig further in an effort to bring the volume of flow back to the original amount. During the two weeks preceding the flow had decreased 50 per cent, no due to clogging. The diggers feel certain that less than a week's drilling will remedy all the troubles and give a flow of 250 gallons per minute again.

No Tobacco in Bull Durham.

It is stated from Washington that proceedings will be instituted against the tobacco trust on account of the discovery made by the pure food department of fraud in tobaccos put out by the trust. The statement is being published all over the country that the pure food department, some time ago analyzed several brands of tobacco, and the brands known as Lucky Strike and English Curve Cut were found to contain 40 per cent tobacco and 60 per cent fine cut brown paper. Bull Durham, the old reliable, that has been considered the standard tobacco for fifty years, contained no tobacco at all but consisted of 100 per cent finely chopped brown paper that had been soaked in tobacco-stem juice, then dried and packed in bags. Duke's Mixture is said to be only 1 per cent tobacco.

The foregoing is taken from a clipping now going the rounds, and the Prineville Review man rises up and says he thinks the whole thing is about 85 per cent hot air. We too, are of the opinion that hot air would be a valuable addition to the compound. He further states that if "Bull Durham" is 100 per cent brown paper why does the tobacco trust put revenue stamps on the bags? If it were not tobacco and the trust said so, it would sell just as readily, and the trust would save a million a year. Then the government itself is a party to the deception if deception there be.
