Chas. Martin, one of Gilliam county's most extensive wheat-growers was a business visitor in Wasco yesterday. Mr. Martin says his wheat is looking fine, and he expects to start his harvester about the fifth or sixth of July and calculates on a run of sixty days. His wheat area comprises about twenty-four hundred acres.

The rain gauge in charge of the News office at Wasco shows a precipitation of .08 of one inch for Monday and .16 of one inch on Tuesday. Thus a total of .24 of an inch has fallen here this week. At the station on Gordon ridge .30 has fallen. It is a well known fact that the wind blows almost constantly on Gordon ridge, a fact which Mr. Hatfield recognizes as being detrimental to his work. Next year, and he has every intention of testing here next year, he will avoid this location.

William Smith, of Silverton, returned again on Friday, and found a suitable mate for the large Clydesdale mare, bought last week of Mr. Johnson, at the farm of Mr. Andrew Thompson, of Monkland, and departed for home with his elegant span of mares Tuesday morning. The Thompson animal weighed about 1700 pounds and was followed by a splendid colt. The price paid for the mare and colt, so we were informed by Mr. Smith, was \$437.50, the span, including the colt, standing him \$777.50, exclusive of time and incidentals.

Yesterday, C. E. Nash of Oregon City, who has been up to Fossil buying horses, brought a band of nineteen head into The Dalles. Three of them were, however, in bad condition, requiring the attention of a veterinary. Mr. Nash explained that in passing the place of Robert Caseberg, at Horseshoe Bend, in Sherman county, five of his horses collided with a loose barbed wire, one of them being so badly injured that he had to shoot it and leave it on G. F. Gunthers' place, and another broke its shoulder. Three others were brought on to town and attended to here. Mr. Nash estimates his damage at \$300 and says if possible he will bring a damage suit against the owner of the fence.—The Dalles Chronicle.
