The Phonograph as a Witness.

The Shock on the Dreadnought.

In the simultaneous discharge of eight of the ten twelve-inch guns of the Dreadnought a shock was given that vessel of 400,000 tons, more than double that of any broadside ever before fired. The guns are fifty-three feet long, and each shell of 850 pounds is discharged by 265 pounds of cordite, with a muzzle velocity of 2,000 miles an hour.
