Farmers Met Last Saturday.

At the meeting of the rainmaker's committee last Saturday afternoon it was decided to retain Mr. Hatfield during next summer, and possibly this fall. The contract has not been drawn but will be practically the same as the present one, with, of course, a difference in the requirement of rainfall. The farmers will ask him to produce, it is thought, not to exceed three inches.

At 3 o'clock a farmer's meeting was called and Mr. Hatfield read an account of his demonstrations here and elsewhere. The meeting was then turned over to the farmers who instructed the old committee to make such arrangements with Mr. Hatfield as they deemed best.

During the week Mr. Hatfield and Judge Fulton will visit the different parts of the county for the purpose of deciding on a sight for next year's camp.

The volunteer wheat being cut for W. M. Barnett is making an average of eight sacks of number one wheat per acre. This is certainly good for volunteer. At this rate it will come close to twenty bushels per acre.

An Important Will Case.

A decision of the Oregon Supreme Court was handed down a few days ago involving points of unusual interest, says the Oregon Scout, of Union. It was the Forena Miller will case. Forena Miller, who had no lineal descendants, had willed her property to Edward Luis and Clara Aughey who had made their homes with deceased since they were children. The will was made three years prior to her death but could not be found. The county court refused to admit the evidence to probate but an appeal was taken to the circuit court where Judge Eakin reversed the decision. An appeal was then taken to the supreme court where Judge Eakin's decision was confirmed. The property involved real estate worth about \$10,000. This is the first time the question of the admission of this kind of testimony has come before the supreme court of this state.

DAMAGING FIRE BARELY AVERTED

Flames Quickly Extinguished at McKee Drug Store

Fire broke out in McKee's drug store just before noon yesterday, but was extinguished before it had done any considerable damage. Immediately when the alarm was given both hose carts were hurried to the scene and the burning part of the building drenched with water. The flames were started by carbolic acid which was being heated becoming ignited. But for effective and quick work it is likely that great loss would have resulted. The damage is said to be about \$200, and results mainly from burning chemicals.
