TURKEYRED WHEAT

Successfully Raised in Walla
Walla Country

Yield Greatly Increased By Sewing
This Variety of Grain in Fields of
Eastern Washington Where
Club formerly Was Grown

A Coast Special reporter, in telling
of the wheat harvest which commen-
ced in Walla Walla county on Mon-
day of last week, says the Turkey
red variety was in first-class condi-
tion for cutting.

The raising of Turkey red is some-
what new in this section of the coun-
try, but it is to be the coming variety
try for Eastern Washington, as is a
harder wheat, maturing earlier than
Bluestem, and being less affected by
dry weather. It also stands the cold
weather of winter better, seldom if
ever freezing out, and is well rooted
and in a growing condition by the
time spring weather opens up.

C. L. Rowe, manager of the Acme
mills of Lamar, has done much to
secure the introduction of this wheat
from the Eastern states. For many
years Mr. Rowe was an active miller
in Kansas and Nebraska, where the
Turkey red is the principal wheat
grown, and after engaging in the
milling business in Eastern Wash-
ington, Mr. Rowe became impressed
with the idea that according to the
climatic conditions and the demands
of the milling trade, this variety
would be the most profitable kind of
wheat for the farmers of this section
of the West to raise.

Farmers who have sown this wheat
this year are certainly well pleased
with the prospects. They have se-
cured good yields and some of the
wheat buyers have announced that
they will pay as much for this wheat
as for Bluestem, and in some cases it
will probably bring a better price.

Big Horse Sale at Umatilla

What will be the largest sale of range
horses ever held in Oregon, will be held
in Umatilla on July 22 and 23, when
Samis Brothers will offer for sale the
bulk of the Switzer horses which are
now being gathered from the ranges in
Benton, Douglas and Klickitat counties
Washington.

One thousand head of horses will be
gathered for this sale and it is expected
over 100 buyers will be present to attend
the sale. Riders are now scouring the
ranges used for the past 40 years by the
Switzer on the north side of the Col-
umbia river and these wild horses will
be rounded up from every part of south-
ern Washington and Umatilla.

This herd of horses will comprise ani-
mals of every kind and description and
many of them are exceedingly well bred
and many fine teams of drivers and sad-
dlers are among them as well as many
heavy draught horses.

Settlers are crowding into the range-
used for so many years by John and
"Jade" Switzer and it is the intention
to close out the vast herds which have
ranged for two hundred miles on the
Columbia river from the Rattlesnake
hills to The Dalles. These horses have
watered on the Columbia river and one
of the most picturesque sights to be
witnessed in the northwest in the past
has been the galloping herds, miles in
length, going down the dusty trails
from the sage brush plains of Klickitat
county to drink at their accustomed
watering places.—East Oregonian.
