Money in State Treasury

The state of Oregon had in her treasury, on July 1, the sum of \$959,084.28, which is by far the greatest amount for the close of any six months' period, except for the corresponding period last year, which was \$1,140,947.42. This latter large surplus, however, was due to the holding up of several of the funds in the treasury on account of the referendum of the general appropriation act.

Not only this, but all funds in the

hands of the treasurer have shown a healthy growth during the past fiscal year, in the semi-annual statement recently given out by State Treasurer Steel, covering the six months ending July 1. This is particularly true in the case of the common school fund interest, which has developed a steady increase from one period to another until on June 30 there was \$240,289.64 on hand, as compared with \$70,981.51 for the corresponding period last year, and \$73,762.43 on December 31, 1906. This fund is subject to distribution among the school districts of the state August 1, and by the time the date of the appointment arrives it is expected this fund will increase steadily from one year to another, in proportion to the growth of the irreducible school fund, the interest from which composes the common school fund, such an immense accumulation was not anticipated even by the official custodian.
