To Farmers and Grainshippers
 Of Sherman County

Hon. W. H. Biggs Interviews Railroad
 Commission and Obtains Hearing
 On Question of Freight Rates
 Over O. R. & N. Lines

Hon. W. H. Biggs returned from
 a business trip to Salem last Friday.
 While in the state capitol Mr. Biggs
 filed with the Railroad Commission a
 formal complaint charging that the
 freight rates on all products, and
 particularly wheat, between Wasco,
 Klondike, Summit, Moro, Grass Val-
 ley and other points on the Biggs-
 Shaniko branch of the O. R. & N.
 and Portland, are unreasonably in
 excess of the rates charged upon the
 same commodities, particularly from
 Rufus, Grants or Biggs, on the main
 line.

Mr. Biggs' principal complaint is
 that, while the rate on carload ship-
 ments of wheat from Shaniko, the
 Southern terminus of the branch, is
 2 cents per ton per mile to Portland,
 the farmers in this vicinity, ten miles
 from Biggs and sixty miles nearer
 Portland than Shaniko, are required
 to pay a rate of 2.37 cents per ton
 per mile or \$2.80 per ton to Portland,
 or an increase of 75 cents per ton,
 or more than 36 per cent increase over
 the \$2.05 per ton rate in effect from
 Rufus, the first station from
 Biggs on the main line. It
 is thought the complaint will come
 up for hearing at the same time as
 the complaint of the Portland Cham-
 ber of Commerce against the rates,
 differentials, etc., of the O. R. & N.

OFFICIAL PARTY
VISITS INTERIOR

Will Investigate Irrigation Projects in
 Central Oregon

A party composed of Governor George
 E. Chamberlain, and State Engineer of
 the Reclamation Service and Special
 Agent Myendorf, of the Deschutes Irr-
 igation & Power Company, passed up the
 line last Saturday en route to Bend,
 to look after the interests of reclama-
 tion work in that section of the state.

The party was to be joined at Red-
 mond by Special Inspector, Thomas B.
 Nehausen of the Department of the
 Interior, who would aid in the investi-
 gation of the work that has been done
 by the reclamation companies.

Two reclamation projects were to be
 visited, those of the Columbia Southern
 Irrigation Company, comprising 27,000
 and that of the Deschutes Irrigation
 & Power Company, comprising 14,000
 acres. These projects are located in the
 western part of Crook county, a dis-
 tance of from 70 to 100 miles from
 Shaniko.

Their mission implied several definite
 objects, including the determination of
 the quantity of water supply, the char-
 acter of the canal system already con-
 structed, the value of the land before
 and after reclamation, and the reason-
 ableness of the lien recently fixed by the
 state land board in a new contract with
 the Deschutes Irrigation and Power
 Company. The lien was fixed at an
 average of \$25 and acre, or \$40 per acre
 for irrigable land.

It was also the mission of the officials
 to study the Columbia Southern project,
 on this trip, with a view to ascertaining
 the best plan of procedure in an effort
 to reorganize the company or dispose of
 its interests so that the rights of the
 settlers may be protected when partial
 payments have been made. The com-
 pany has turned its affairs over to its
 bondholders. A subject of investiga-
 tion also is as to the good faith of set-
 tlers who have purchased lands, many
 of them being to all appearances specu-
 lators and not homeseekers.
