Ordered that city rent council rooms from Mrs. J. W. Booth on same terms as from Mr. Booth, and that mayor have a lease for one year drawn up.

Aldermen Booth and Murchie were appointed a committee to wait on Wasco News and People's Republic and get bids for balance of printing.

Adjourned till next regular meeting.
