AERATING MILK.

What Various Authorities Say on the Subject.

Hard's Dairyman says that there is hardly a place in which milk is used that it will not pay to cool and aerate it at the same time. Such milk brought to the creamery or cheese factory, if all the patrons would practice it, would show at once in the increased quality of the product and the price. The difficulty is that there are so many patrons who don't believe in any improvement if it is going to cost something to set it at work. Yet wherever there is a factory or creamery that has prevailed on its patrons to practice aeration and cooling that institution stands high in the price received for its product.

Cornell experiment station in bulletin No. 39 published a table showing results of tests made to ascertain the keeping qualities of milk aerated by the champion milk cooler and aerator in comparison with milk aerated by a machine for stirring and airing the milk and in comparison with milk neither cooled nor aerated. The result showed that the milk aerated and cooled by stirring kept sweet no longer than the un-aerated milk, but that the milk aerated by the champion milk cooler kept sweet in some instances 14 hours longer. Summing up the results of these tests, Professor Wing said that owing to the special conditions of cleanliness and care in the Cornell dairy the results in favor of such aeration was not nearly so great as would be obtained under ordinary farm conditions.

The New York farmers' institute bulletin gives the following excellent advice on this subject: So do not be misled by a few freaks who will tell you that the aeration of milk is of no value to the dairyman, who will tell you that aerated milk will not remain sweet one whit longer than any other milk. Be not misled by these, we say, but try for yourself. Get a good combined cooler and aerator and use it every day in the year, winter and summer alike. In buying a cooler and aerator don't make the mistake of getting one that airs the milk without cooling it. Don't make the mistake of getting one that cools the milk before it airs it, as aeration to drive out animal and food odors must be done while the milk is hot from the cow and before any reduction in the temperature has been made.

Struggle to Keep Milk Pure.

It is an unending struggle, says The Breeder's Gazette, to keep the milk pure from the cow to the consumer. The honest best does her work. If her milk sometimes falls under a 3 per cent content of butter fat, it is not her fault. She was bred that way and fed that way. But the handler and manufacturer of her milk is limited in his roguery only by his wife's ends and the law. He waters the milk or robs it partially of its fat. He colors and thickens the cream to give it the appearance of greater thickness and richness. He mixes neutral oil with butter and produces a counterfeit article. He takes rancid "saler grease" butter or oleo oil and turns out "filled" cheese. He uses boracic acid or borax, which are substances deleterious to the stomach, and thus keeps milk and cream "sweet." He adulterates, deteriorates and weakens milk, cream, butter and cheese, and he thereby robs. Among the latest aids to this deception and trickery is a substance called albuminoid, composed of boracic acid and gelatin, which is used to thicken and preserve cream. The producer who is suspicious that his milkman or marketman is perpetrating any of these frauds on him should take samples of the suspected products and forward them to his state experiment station or his city health department for examination. Public exposure of such evildoers will have a wholesome effect, even if there is no law to be invoked in punishment.

Skim Milk Calves.

Professor Curtis of Iowa is preparing a paper for publication showing the results of experiments in calf raising by skim milk or separated milk. Generally speaking, the results have been highly satisfactory. When Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture was director of the Iowa experiment station, some experiments were conducted of this character. Shorthorn calves were taken as subjects and immediately upon being dropped were removed from the cows and fed upon warm, separated milk, fresh from the milking. They were kept upon this diet the usual time during which a calf is allowed to suck and gradually changed to a grain and grass diet. When 2 years old, they averaged 1,400 pounds each, and the cows bearing them had mean times made over 3600 pounds of butter each per annum. Record was kept of the cost of the feed. Cornmeal was found an excellent complement to the skim milk, the latter being rich in nitrogenous properties while the corn is rich in carbohydrates, the two thus forming a cheap and well balanced ration. The difference in cost lay in the fact that the fat or oil in the corn was worth about 1 cent per pound, whereas that in the cream was worth 20 cents a pound.

Better Butter For Export.

Some years ago we expressed our belief that when exporters got courage to buy the highest grades of American butter and ship it to England we should have a larger trade there and a better reputation than we could get while they sent only third rate, imitation and lardie packed butter, which could be bought cheap at such times as the market was overstocked with low grade goods. Per taining the efforts of Secretary of Agriculture Wilson have had much influence in this matter, but some of the ship pers have helped him, and our exports are increasing, while it is now reported that American butter sells at higher prices in London than the best Danish or any other grade.
