District Conference.

The Dalles district conference which was in session in Moro last week, beginning June 6th, closed with services Sunday evening, and most of the delegates departed for their homes on Monday, well pleased with the success of their meetings.

The services began with a sermon by Rev. Chas. Elery, of Wasco. Wednesday morning the conference was called to order by Rev. R. Warner in the chair. Rev. J. H. Wood, of The Dalles, was elected secretary. The morning session was mainly occupied by the appointment of committees and examinations.

Rev. J. H. Wood read a paper on "How May We Lead and Hold the Church to its Best Possible Service?" Rev. J. W. Flesher read a paper on the subject, "Doctrines Disseminated Among Our People Which We Consider Erroneous and Dangerous to the Welfare of God's Cause." The discussions upon these papers were animated. At 3 p. m., Rev. W. H. Henderson, of West Kittitas preached a sermon, and Rev. William Hoskins, of Prineville, preached in the evening.

The second day reports of various committees were read and adopted. Several local preachers' and exhorters' licenses were renewed. Rev. R. Warner spoke to the convention about the work accomplished in the district at large, which indicated a large increase of church property and membership. Rev. F. Spaulding preached in the afternoon, and Rev. J. H. Wood in the evening.

Friday morning the district Epworth League convention opened with Rev. N. Evans, district president, in the chair. Miss Martha Wheelton, secretary. Many excellent papers were read, and the reports from the various chapters indicated that the membership of the district had increased about 70 per cent during the year. The Epworth and Juniors League membership of the district is about 1000. The first day's session of the league concluded with a sermon by Dr. Hawk, of North Yakima. The second day's session was devoted to reports from committees and miscellaneous business. Rev. John Evans, of Columbus, Wash., preached in the evening.

About 100 attended the sunrise prayer meeting Sunday. Rev. H. C. Clark, of Lone Rock, led the love feast at 10 a. m., and Dr. John W. Flesher, of Heppner, occupied the pulpit in the morning. At 3 p. m., Mr. M. G. Martin, of North Yakima, organized a Junior League, with 45 members. Miss Constance Wheelton, of The Dalles, led the service in the evening, and at the conclusion Dr. N. Evans, of Goldendale, delivered a sermon. The convention concluded with a general consecration service. About 100 ministerial and lay delegates attended the conference and convention. The new church was filled to its full capacity at each service. Heppner was chosen as the place of the next convention.
