William Holland Beal.

Died—At his home in this city, Friday morning, Nov. 13, 1906, William Holland Beal, aged 64 years, six months and 19 days.

The subject of this sketch was a well known resident of Central Point for the past 12 years. He was born in Peoria, Illinois, but when a young man he removed to Kansas and was there during the troublous times of the civil war. He enlisted in the 12th Kansas regiment of volunteers in 1862, but at the time his regiment was mustered into the service he was sick and unable for the time being to be with his comrades. During his convalescence, and before he was able to join his company, he was captured by the forces of Generals Price and Marmaduke, during their raid through the border country, and was held a prisoner for five months, being finally exchanged as a prisoner of war. Some time after the war he removed to Colorado and was a resident of Leadville during the palmy days of that famous camp. He was married at that place December 16, 1879, to Mrs. Lizzie Walker, who with five children survive him.

Deceased had been an invalid for the past eight years, and on the evening preceding his death he returned from a visit in California, where he had spent several weeks with his sister. He was apparently in his usual health on his return, but during the evening he was stricken with hemorrhage of the brain and died the following morning, as above stated.

The surviving children are: Mrs. Cecelia Fifield, of Wolf Creek, Oregon; Mrs. Madge Wall, of Glendale, Oregon; Arthur Beal, of Junction City, Oregon; Ralph Beal and Harry Beal, who reside with their mother at Central Point.

The funeral services were held at the family residence Sunday afternoon, being conducted by T. M. Jones, of this city. The interment was in the Central Point cemetery.

A Rich Community.

J. C. Pendleton, of Table Rock, was in the city the other day. In the section north of Rogue River comprising Table Rock and vicinity they have one of the largest and best crops of apples that they have ever had. The reason for the size of the crop lies in the fact that many new orchards are coming into bearing and that, again, is one of the reasons for the quality thereof. The people of that section did not commence growing apples for export until after the experiment had been tried for several years on this side of the river and therefore had the experience of others to guide them in the selection of varieties and the avoidance of mistakes. As a consequence the Table Rock section is turning out this year as fine a lot of Spitzenbergs and Newtowns as one would wish to see. There will be over 12,000 boxes of apples marketed from that section and most of them will be shipped abroad. R. C. Washburn will have 4500 boxes, the Shipley orchard will have at least 4300 boxes, the Lutcomb orchard over 2,000 more and at least 1500 boxes will come from smaller orchards in the neighborhood. Apples do not comprise all that is raised in that part of the valley. Table Rock produces some of the finest grains and vegetables grown in the county and some of the most openhearted, hospitable people on earth live there.—Medford Tribune.
