Under the present state laws fuse to elect successors, turn the cities are taken out of the hands of the legislature and placed directly in the hands of tha people of the local municipalities. Formerly, when it became negessary to amend a town or city charter or to adopt a new one the matter had to be passed on by the state legislature. Under the present plan all this is changed and such questions must be submitted to the voters of the town or city directly affected. But before this state law may be applied to any town or city an ordinance making operativa the initiative and referendum law must be adopted by the city council or board of town trustees. Such an ordinance has, after months of waiting, been prepared for passage by the town board of Gentral Point, but at the last meeting the board, took the position that a petition from citizens and taxpayers must accompany the ordinance before the Board would take official cognizance of it.
