

Haywood Acquitted.

The Haywood jury at Boise returned a verdict of acquittal last Sunday morning after being out 21 hours.

Haywood is secretary of the Western Federation of Miners and when ex-Governor Steunenburg was murdered at Caldwell, Idaho, a determined effort was made by the Pinkerton detectives and the Colorado mineowners to fasten the crime on the Federation officials.

Harry Orchard, the self-confessed murderer, left such a plain trail of his fiendish act that his arrest followed as a matter of course and soon after he professed religion and then made a confession to Detective McParland implicating Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone. Their abduction and forcible taking to Idaho, without process of law, followed.

Since his confession Orchard has been held as a favored guest, rather than a prisoner, at the Idaho penitentiary and was the star witness against Haywood. Evidently, however, his story did not have much influence with the jury.

Has Lost Confidence.

T. M. Witten has lost all confidence in railroad trains and dry goods salesmen. Last Saturday evening he decided to go to Ashland to visit his family, planning to take the 11:00 p. m. train. He missed it. Sunday morning he discovered that he needed a new shirt and in his innocence he confided his urgent need to a merchant friend, who offered to accommodate him. The merchant is a practical joker, however, and instead of giving his customer a 16 size as ordered he wrapped up a 13 boy's size. Mr. Witten took his purchase home and, after enjoying a bath, was hurrying into his clothing, as he planned to take the 10:11 train to Ashland. After divers frantic struggles to get into his new garment and to make a No. 13 collarband fasten around a 16 neck he suspected something was wrong and found it was more difficult to get out of the shirt than to get into it. Just then the train whistled. He missed it. Mr. Witten is said to be planning to buy an automobile and boycott the railroad and also to buy a high-top vest for emergencies when it may become necessary to boycott the joking shirt salesman.

Rules for Oregon Railroads.

The railway commission has made an order which will effect every railroad company in the state and which will be effective on all lines. The order is the result of a hearing conducted at the capitol some days ago relative to the inadequacy of accommodations at the various railway stations in the state. The order will go into effect twenty days from date and among others has the following provisions:

"All passenger waiting rooms and passenger cars used in this state shall be supplied with pure drinking water and lighted, heated and equipped so as to render the occupants reasonably comfortable.

"Suitable toilet rooms shall be provided and kept clean at each station where an agent is maintained.

"Waiting rooms and ticket offices having an agent shall be open for the accommodation of the traveling public at least thirty minutes before the scheduled time of the arrival of all passenger trains scheduled to stop at such station and shall be kept open after the arrival of such passenger trains for such length of time as will afford passengers a reasonable opportunity to transact business and to leave the station.

"In case of delayed trains, waiting rooms shall be kept open until the actual arrival of such delayed train.

"Waiting rooms at junctions shall be kept open when necessary for the accommodation of passengers waiting to transfer from one line to the other.

"Platforms shall be kept lighted at night when the waiting room is, by these rules, required to be open."
