Medford Merchants' Carnival and Fruit Fair, Medford, Oregon, August 5th to 10th, 1907.

Following is a brief outline of the week's program:

Beginning the evening of Tuesday, August 6, 1907, and continuing to and including Saturday, August 10th, there will be a Merchants' Carnival and Fruit Fair at Medford, under the auspices of the Medford Commercial Club, in connection with the business men of Medford.

On August 8th, 9th and 10th the State Horticultural Society will convene in Medford and there will be delegates from all over the state of Oregon.

It is proposed to erect two large arches across the principal streets of Medford and illuminate the same with electric lights for the night time and suitable decorations for the day time; and in connection with this the business men will decorate their buildings in an attractive manner and illuminate same with incandescent lamps. It is also proposed to have numerous incandescent lamps to decorate the carnival grounds on the railroad right-of-way, on both sides of the depot and exhibit building.

In the afternoons there will be games, rock drilling contests, automobile races and other amusements, and many other carnival attractions, full particulars of which will be announced later.

On the evenings of August 8th, 9th and 10th there will be public speaking by prominent horticulturists on different fruit topics in addition to their regular exercises and business meetings during the day time. Also the carnival attractions will be in full blast.

On the evenings of the 5th, 6th and 7th there will be public speaking on the topics of the day by prominent speakers in addition to regular carnival attractions.

It is intended to make this carnival one of the most noteworthy events Medford has ever witnessed in point of distinction as well as amusement.

In connection with the above event the Southern Pacific R. R. will sell tickets, on the certificate plan, from all stations in Oregon for one and one-third fare, the minimum fare on all such reduced rate tickets being 50 cents.

Town Board Meets.

The town board met in regular session Monday evening and transacted routine business. The ordinance committee submitted their report on an ordinance making operative the initiative and referendum in Central Point and the ordinance was read and placed on its final passage. It was adopted by a unanimous vote of the board.

The adoption of this ordinance brings the matter of local government directly to the people, and it is now possible for citizens to take the initiative in matters of necessary legislation or to invoke the referendum on actions of the town board.

The water committee reported that steps are being taken to secure information relative to the probable cost of a water system, and were given further time to carry on this work.

Members of the board appear to be uniformly friendly to the water works proposition, and there seems to be every reason to believe that the present is the last Summer season that the town will need to go through the hot months without a bountiful supply of water for all purposes.
