

**The Buzzard Mining Group.**

W. C. Leever and J. W. Merritt, of this place, and Peter Applegate, of Jacksonville, owners of the Buzzard group, on Elk Creek, about 45 miles northeast of Central Point, have recently bonded the property to a syndicate of New York and English capitalists, the bond to run for 14 months from July 1st. Recently J. T. Maclean, a prominent mining engineer, of New York city, arrived here as a representative of the prospective purchasers to examine the property and to report on the same.

Mr. Maclean returned from the mines last Saturday morning and his statements to Mr. Leever and Mr. Merritt indicated that he was not only astonished at the magnitude of the proposition, but that he was more than pleased with the property. He left Saturday forenoon for Ashland and stated that he would lose no time in having his samples assayed and in getting his report ready for his principals.

The Buzzard group was discovered several years ago, and considerable development work has already been done on the property by the present owners. The property is an immense porphyry dike embracing the entire mountain and is a strictly quarrying proposition, there being, it is claimed, millions of tons of ore in sight at this time. A number of prospecting shafts and tunnels have been driven and all show comparatively the same values, which run \$3.50 and better per ton. A Huntington mill with a capacity of 12 tons of ore per day was installed on the property several years ago for prospecting purposes and a number of trial runs have been made at various times, all of which have been eminently satisfactory. Last month Messrs. Leever and Applegate, with a small force of men, made a run of a few days and the results were better than any of the owners hoped for.

Mr. Maclean stated that the parties now holding the bond will at once improve the present mill and add an additional concentrator so that better results may be secured in their initial prospecting work than the present plant is capable of and he will recommend that a new plant of 200 tons daily capacity be placed on the property as soon as the same can be secured after they have decided to take up the bond. Tests will be made to determine what method can be best employed to handle the ore, whether by the cyanida process or with a smelter.

The property is likely to develop into one of the world's great mines and will be in the same class as the Treadwell, in Alaska, and the Homestake, at Deadwood.

The development of such a mine in this section will mean much to Central Point and all of the Rogue River Valley. Power for all purposes can readily be obtained from Rogue River, above Prospect, either from the company's own plant or from the Condor Water and Power Co.'s proposed plant at Prospect. It is altogether probable that the next few months will see much activity at the camp.
