The appointment of Mr. Payne gives general satisfaction to the faculty and student body of the school, with all of whom he is very popular.

## Town Board Meets.

The Town Board met in regular session Monday evening, when considerable business was attended to. Routine business was disposed of and the regular bills were audited and allowed. The resignation of W. J. Freeman was accepted and placed on file.

The matter of removing the street light from the railroad crossing to the corner of Fourth and Oak streets was brought up by a delegation of residents of the west side and a vigorous protest was made. It appearing that the removal was unauthorized by the board, whereupon an order was made directing that the light be returned to its former position.

T. J. Kelson was present, representing citizens of the northeast part of town, and offered to install a street light at corner of Cherry and 7th streets without expense to the city if the city would support the light after it is installed. The desired permission was given.

The sanitary committee was instructed to notify persons to remove manure and other debris from alleys and other public places.

An order was made directing the proposed new charter to be published according to law in the Central Point Herald.

Mrs. Irene Hampton Isaacs has opened a studio at her residence on East Seventh street, Medford, and will receive piano pupils.

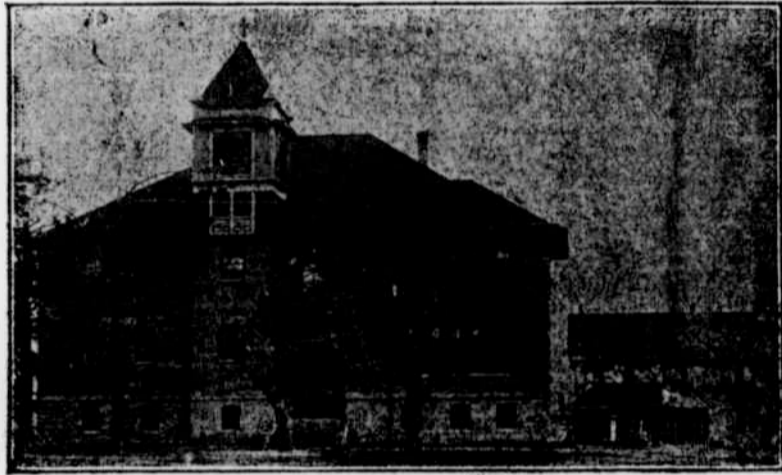

## Three Generations of School Houses.

The above cut shows something of the advancement that has been made in Central Point in the matter of school buildings in the past 50 years. The small building was erected about 1859; the two-story frame was built in 1888, and the beautiful brick structure was built in 1906. The two-story frame building still stands on the school grounds and is in a good state of preservation. It will probably be needed next year to furnish additional room for the rapidly growing school. The smaller building was sold last year and removed to another part of town, where it is serving as a barn.

Her last teacher, Herr Herman Genss, the president of the California conservatory of music, is lavish in praise of her wonderful achievements, her marvelous technique and musicianly interpretations. For so young an artist and so earnest a worker, the future offers almost unlimited possibilities. That she has decided to give Medford the benefit of her talent and wide musical knowledge is great cause for rejoicing among those interested in this greatest of all arts.—Medford Tribune.
