STATEMENT NO. 1.

The Republican county central committee of Marion county held a meeting the other day at which the party managers present went on record as opposed to Statement No. 1. The committee decided to call a county mass convention to select five candidates for the legislature who are opposed to the Statement No. 1 policy of allowing the people to choose their United States senators. It is stated in the press dispatches that this is the opening gun in the campaign which is to be made against that policy and in favor of restoring the full power of the selection and election of senators to the legislature. It is also stated that the friends of Senator Fulton are particularly active in seeking to restore the old method of electing senators which would indicate that the senator, who is a candidate for reelection, considers his chances better in the legislature than if submitted to a popular vote. The election of senators by the legislature has in the past been sometimes a difficult and once an impossible job and it has many times been generally considered a dirty, disreputable and corrupt mess in which honorable members were sold and bartered like so many swine in the market and if we are to believe some of the disclosures recently made by both Mr. Heney and Senator Fulton in the present controversy, we must conclude that Senator Fulton at least had some inkling of what was going on during the several senatorial contests when he was a member of the legislature. It is strange, then, that he should favor a return to the old method which he must know was so often the cause of scandal and reported corruption. The effort to set aside Statement No. 1 is plainly the work of the remnant of the old political machine which once held the state of Oregon in political bondage and which is still loath to allow the people to do anything more than to vote the ticket, pay taxes and look pleasant.

THE DISTRICT ATTORNEYSHIP.

The wrangle which has been in progress for the past month or more among the Oregon congressional delegation regarding the appointment of a man to succeed Mr. Bristol as U. S. District Attorney for Oregon is getting past the stage of being a joke and is becoming a simple nuisance. No man can be suggested for the place by either party to the controversy, it appears, but that charges of some sort can be made against him and he is either dropped or withdraws his name as though there was grave danger that the charges might be substantiated upon investigation.

Is it possible that there is nowhere in Oregon a lawyer of unquestioned ability and integrity upon whom the delegation could agree or is it only a game of politics that is being played by our honorable senators and representatives? It is a fact that federal court business is being delayed and hampered and that the right of many accused persons to a speedy trial is being denied, but that seems to make no difference to Bourne and Fulton, Hawley and Ellis. It is not so much a question of who is the best man for the position as it is a question of "Who did he vote for last time and who will he vote for next time?" If the Oregon delegation in congress have no more important work to do back there but to wrangle over appointments which appear to be made more as a method of paying political debts than for the benefit of the State of Oregon they had better come home. Isn't it about time for the plain, common people to reverse that famous sentence of Jay Gould and say "The politicians be damned!"

Ten years ago, on February 17th, the soul of Frances E. Willard took its flight to be with God. The whole nation—yes, the world—mourned. By order of the mayor of Chicago all flags flew at half mast while her remains lay in that city.

On February 17, 1906, the State of Illinois placed her statue in Statuary Hall at Washington, where it is the only statue of a woman.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, for which she gave her life, request each local union to hold a memorial service on her heavenly birthday and send two dollars to the organizing fund of the society. Thus the fitting memorial of her beloved society is a constant, growing one.

Have you ever asked yourself why all this honor? The cause she espoused was not then a popular one. The society she loved was not great in numbers; its treasury was low. With less of love and intellect, her sex would have shadowed her fame.

The answer comes from the lips of the Master. Like Mary, "She hath done what she could." Her life motto, "My life is a vow," kept her constantly living for God and home and native land.

A few quotations from her lips and pen give us an insight to her thoughts, work and crowning success. At the organization of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union Miss Willard wrote the following resolution: "Resolved, That, recognizing that our cause is and will be contested by mighty, determined and relentless forces, we will, trusting in Him who is the Prince of Peace, meet argument with argument, misjudgment with patience, denunciation with kindness, and all our difficulties and dangers with prayer."

These quotations hung on the walls of her "den": "Love one another as I have loved you." "Nothing is inexorable but love." These from her pen: "It is a noble thing to be an architect and build grand cathedrals; but grander far to teach somebody—who had not found it out—that the body and the soul were made on purpose to be the temple of the Holy Ghost, in which shall dwell nothing that is not pure and white and clean."
