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THINK IT OUT.

(Pacific Outlook, Rep.)

What is Statement No. 1? Well, you read the Portland Journal and you find out what it is—ought to be—or may be, when the froth of agitation has worked off. You read the Portland Oregonian and you find out what it is not or never can be. The more you read the more you will be befuddled, for there is a lot of slush handed out along with the logic of those who oppose the principles of the thing. As a matter of fact, both the advocates and the opponents of this method of carrying out the will of the people are working largely upon hypotheses. What Statement No. 1 might accomplish along this line, and what it will accomplish are two very different propositions, to be demonstrated only by experience. If any of our readers are stuck on the problem we can only advise you to sit down in front of the heater after supper, with your elbows on your knees and your lower jaw in your hands, and stay there until you have figured it out. Ten to one you will come as near being right in your conclusions as the majority of the wisecracks. Don't swallow any of the sophistry about its being in defiance of the national constitution. It is no more a violation of the constitution for the people to express their desires as to a United States senator than it is to express themselves on any other subject. Don't imbibe any gas with regard to its being designed to wreck the Republican party. It is designed to place the man above the party. It must be conceded that, as a rule, the choice of the majority is a wise choice, else it stands confessed that the masses are incapable of intelligent self-government. The man who is afraid of majority rule needs to be set right in his bearings.

The man who would rather see a yellow dog elected from his own party than a square-built white man from the opposing party is out of place in this state and era of progress. The man who prefers the old regime of swapping, juggling, scheming and wrangling over a United States senator, to the operation of Statement No. 1 is badly shop-worn and should be put on the bargain counter, along with other antiquities.

Statement No. 1 may send a Democrat to the United States senate. We don't think it will, but if it does we will take our medicine cheerfully and continue to reiterate that any means or measure that places the people in closer touch with the centre of government is a good thing to tie to.

"The trend of civilization has always been westward," said Henry Watson Cornell in a lecture recently delivered before Portland business men, "since it crossed Asia to sweep through Europe. Immigration is now flowing West, through the United States with irresistible force, but the Pacific coast is the limit of this great tidal movement, and here will be found the greatest cities of the world. The solidity and substantial character of Portland must impress any visitor, while the vast tributary district of both Oregon and Washington represents greater wealth than can ever be taken from the gold mines of the continent."

Reform News.

By act of Congress, the surplus of the Boer indemnity has been returned to the Chinese, notwithstanding the widespread assumption that the wives of missionaries put in exorbitant claims for their wardrobes. It is stated authoritatively that many refused to claim any indemnity lest that act might embitter the Chinese. The claims presented were largely for schools, hospitals, missionaries' residences, libraries and furniture.

Great preparations are being made to receive the U. S. fleet now en route for the Pacific coast. San Diego is planning a magnificent floral parade, Los Angeles a three days' barbecue for the "boys" and a ball, banquet and reception for the officers. The W. C. T. U. asks that no liquors be served. The committee ruled liquors out of the barbecue.

A "straw vote" on the canteen was taken at the National Soldiers' Home at Sawtelle, Cal. Only 59 ballots were cast in favor of the bar and 412 against.

To the bill revising the penal laws Senator Clay, of Georgia, offered an amendment which prohibits the sending of liquids through the mails. It was carried unanimously. This restriction is contained in the present law and had been purposely omitted from the revised bill.

Laboring men consider the custom of paying them Saturday evenings with a check both a hardship and a temptation. Oftentimes only the saloon, and that saloon which they patronize, will cash the check. In many places this system is protested and cash payment requested.

The one-hundredth anniversary of the first temperance society in modern history is approaching. It was organized by Dr. Billy J. Clark near Saratoga Springs, N. Y. A World's Temperance Centennial Congress will be held at Saratoga in June. The committee having this centennial in charge request all churches, Sunday schools, young people's societies and temperance organizations to observe April 5th as a Billy J. Clark Memorial.

Various organizations in the Oregon Development League are adopting a special letter-head for use during March and April only—something so striking that the colonist rates cannot be overlooked by its recipient. Business men are using the same stationery. Already answers are arriving to advertisements inserted in the greatest agricultural, fruit and dairy journals of the country by the League about the middle of February, and long lists of enquirers are being sent to the different commercial secretaries whose organizations are affiliated with the State body. Hundreds of thousands of pieces of literature are going East from every part of Oregon. Every mail carries its message. Especially valuable are the fruit bulletins and report of the Oregon State Dairy Association sent from the home office. The Los Angeles Information Bureau, maintained by Oregon, reports a number of people coming north immediately as a consequence of its few weeks' work.

Notice to Subscribers.

A recent ruling by the Post Office Department restricts the extension of credit by newspaper publishers to their subscribers to a period not to exceed one year from the date to which the subscription is paid. When a subscriber is one year in arrears his name must be dropped or a one-cent stamp must be affixed to each copy of the paper mailed to him. This, of course, is prohibitive, and as a failure to observe the ruling would result in being denied the second-class postage rate, a strict compliance with the rule is necessary. The rule went into effect Jan. 1st with April 1st named as the final limit for complying with its provisions. The Herald will shortly mail statements to such of its subscribers as are in arrears and will hope to receive a reply from all before April 1st.
