SIRES AND SONS.

Victor N. Metcalf, aged twenty-five, son of Secretary Metcalf, midshipman, has resigned from the navy on account of ill health.

William F. MacLennan, chief of the bookkeeping and warrants division of the treasury department, is the man who keeps track of the public debt. This debt amounts to \$2,467,869,901, and while he does not actually have possession of the vast sum, all the accounts are turned over to him, and every dollar that is distributed by the government is disposed of by Mr. MacLennan by means of warrants.
