Roycrofters Coming to Valley.

Sanford Hubbard, son of Elbert Hubbard, the famous lecturer and editor of the Philistine, is in Medford sizing up the country with the view of starting a branch of the Roycrofters here, and engaging in the business of making fine and fancy furniture.

The Roycrofters, as Mr. Hubbard and his followers call themselves, are a cooperative industrial organization whose aim is to express art in their manual products and to revive the almost obsolete art of turning out handmade articles remarkable for their beauty and excellence rather than for their cheapness. Practically everything made by the Roycrofters is something which has been a product of the modern workshop.

Young Mr. Hubbard is very much pleased with Medford and the surrounding country, and if native materials in sufficient quantity to justify the establishment of a Roycroft colony, undoubtedly its establishment will follow and Medford become the western home for those who have restored the lost arts.—Medford Tribune

Judge H. M. Cake, of Portland, who is seeking the nomination for United States senator as a strictly Statement No. 1 republican, was in town last Friday in the interest of his candidacy. Eggleston for County Judge.

At the earnest solicitation of many voters and taxpayers in all parts of the county, Captain M. F. Eggleston, of Ashland, has consented to make the race for the republican nomination for county judge.
