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PROGRESSIVE MEN NEEDED.

The Rogue River valley is no longer a backwoods community but is rapidly becoming one of the best known and most rapidly developing sections of the state. People with money and brains and progressive ideas are coming here to make homes and the rapid advance in realty values indicates that the spirit of progress is at hand. In view of these things it is absolutely necessary that progressive men—men of modern methods and who will pursue progressive policies—should be placed in charge of county affairs in the court house at Jacksonville, in order that Jackson County may keep pace with the Rogue River valley.

As a matter of fact, the present county officials, or at least that portion of them who have to do with the assessment of property, the levying and collection of taxes and the expenditure of public money, are FAILURES when measured by the square of modern business methods or when the rule of giving all taxpayers a square deal is applied. Their methods are antiquated and moss-covered and they assume that the methods of 50 years ago are good enough for the present day. Their best friends do not pretend to claim that the assessment of property during the past few years has been anything more than a farce or that the assessment has been equitable or just.

The county court a few months ago made a flat raise of 66 per cent on the tax levy and then solemnly published to the people that it was only a 40 per cent raise and stayed with that story until some outsider made the discovery and "called the bluff." It is evident that the board either did not know that the raise was 66 per cent or they were dishonest in telling the people that it was only 40 per cent. In either case the people should call for a new deal and should nominate and elect men who can compute a tax levy intelligently and give the information concerning such levy to the people of the county truthfully.

The people also need a new deal on the county road question and need it badly. Progressive states and counties have the matter of road building down to a system and they have good roads and are constantly improving them. In Jackson County road making seems to be "up to" the "system" and we have abominable roads and they are getting worse every year.

"To err is human" is an axiom accepted by practically everybody except Jackson County officials regarding their own work. These gentlemen turn a deaf ear to appeals from the taxpayers to have the county books examined by some competent expert accountant and a report made to the people as to the real financial condition of the county. Such a thing has not been done in Jackson County for 40 or 50 years, therefore our county judges and commissioners seem to think that it is not necessary (or perhaps not expedient) now.

Yes; Jackson County needs a bunch of progressive men in the court house—men who know how; men who will do things in a modern, methodical, systematic manner and who will expend the people's money wisely and judiciously and give them something in the way of passable roads and safe bridges in return for the
