A MINT JULEP.

Henry Watterson of the Louisville Courier-Journal, who is still hailed by Kentuckians as the greatest journalist in the world, just as Harvey Scott was so hailed by Oregonians years ago, enjoyed a fine Mint Julep the other day and, under the benign influence of that delightful beverage, he gave forth the following editorial utterance:

"Audax, audax, and again audax, and audax, the world, from the lawless suspension of a postoffice in Mississippi to the hazardous peace congress in New Hampshire; ever the Giant with the Big Stick; an indefatigable giant; an industrious, sober paterfamilias giant; like Mrs. Malaprop's Mr. Cerebus, 'three gentlemen in one,' now the hero of natural history and now the master-singer of the spelling bee; Briareus, with one foot upon the corporations and the other upon the whole duty of man; today forcing a negro official upon South Carolina, tomorrow claiming kindred with Lee and Stonewall Jackson, and having his claim allowed; our first truly national president, half northern and southern; a Yankee crossed on a rebel, compelling the Republican party of Grant and Garfield, of McKinley and Dingley, of bloody-shirtism and high protectionism, to change its coat of plutoeracy and to put on the garments of socialism; and to fall in behind the van of populist righteousness and reform!"

GOOD ROADS NEEDED.

A matter that would be of equal importance to the citizens of both Jackson and Josephine counties, would be the building of a main highway direct through both counties, or extending at least from Ashland to Grants Pass. This road, as it now is, is the most used thoroughfare in Southern Oregon, and to say that it is the worst road in the counties, is putting it mildly. The road is simply in its worst possible condition, and no work is being done at all. While we do not wish to question the wisdom of the Honorable County Court of Jackson county, yet we feel, and do not hesitate to say that they have made themselves liable to much criticism from the manner in which they have handled the road affairs in that county. They are not the only ones who have done so, for the same policy has been in force for years past. Now Jackson and Josephine are fast becoming two of the leading counties of the state, and it is time that they were giving some attention to road building, and the building of a main thoroughfare should be their object. The road would be about 45 miles long, and would pass through all the main towns of the two counties, and naturally the larger number of taxpayers would derive the benefit therefrom. Automobiles are becoming a popular thing throughout both counties, and the owners of machines should take this matter up and see it through. As it is now, from five to six miles is the longest distance of good roads in any one place in Southern Oregon.—Gold Hill News.
