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AN IDEA FROM JAPAN

Depositors' committees of suspended banks and trust companies will find an interesting precedent in the action taken by the depositors of the Chiyoda Bank in Japan. After fruitless efforts to obtain payment they have formally requested the President, Viscount Hori, to commit hara-kiri in expiation.

At a time when China is considering the adoption of Western banking methods it might be profitable to introduce in America the Japanese idea of compulsory suicide as a penalty for bank-rueking. The remedy would prove as effective as Hara's plan for preventing train wrecks by tying a director to the cow-catcher. It might cause an appreciable diminution of our Italian population and considerably curtail the income of transatlantic steamship companies. But it would economize the time of grand juries and save money spent in court prosecutions.

To put hara-kiri on the statute books might not be feasible. But it could readily be incorporated in the body of the unwritten law or included in Judge Lynch's code.

H. M. Cake is the logical man to succeed Charles W. Fulton as United States senator from Oregon. Mr. Cake is a gentleman of recognized ability and has been foremost in promoting the best interests of the state for the past several years. Aside from this he is not a politician; in the old-time acceptance of that term, but is a clean, honorable citizen of Oregon, who, if elected to represent the state in the senate of the United States, will do so from the standpoint of the best interests of the common people of Oregon rather than with a view to serving any special interest or any political machine. If you are a republican, vote for him at the primary and you will make no mistake.

Every voter who believes in the election of United States senators by the people rather than the barter and sale of that office by members of the legislature will vote for Statement No. 1 candidates at the primary. It isn't so much a question of party as it is a question of political decency as against the conditions of political debauchery that have on numerous occasions prevailed at Salem. The legislative aspirant who refuses to pledge himself to abide by the expressed will of the people of the state in the selection of a U. S. senator is a good man to leave at home. He can do less harm there than he might do if sent to Salem.

If you are a republican and have been thinking of voting for Charles W. Fulton at the primaries tomorrow you'd better read Henny's speech at Portland last Saturday night, in the Sunday Journal, and after doing so see if you do not feel like voting for H. M. Cake. Just try this little stunt once for the fun of it, as well as for the good of Oregon.

It is with regret that the friends of temperance reform learn of the resignation of Hon. Charles E. Littlefield, of Maine. For nine years this Representative has led the temperance battles in the U. S. Congress. His ability, earnestness and persistency made him inexpressibly valuable to the cause that needs assistance.

President Roosevelt recommends that Congress reimburse the persons who furnished the money to ransom Miss Ellen M. Stone from Bulgarian bandits. The money was raised by missionary organizations.

An article written by Mae S. Maloney in a recent issue of the Philadelphia North American declares that '90 per cent of the women brought under the care of the police matrons are 'drunks' and that a portion of the 10 per cent are charged with offenses primarily resulting from drink.' She further announces that the drink habit among women, although on the increase during the last three years, has within the last six or nine months risen by leaps and bounds. Of 1,035 arrests in February, 1908, 135 were women, the number of drunken persons of both sexes amounting to 750.

The London Council has established trades' scholarship for boys. They are intended to offer boys of 13 and 14 years of age opportunities for technical instruction which will qualify them to become skilled laborers. They include scholarships in engineering, building, woodcarving, silversmithing, printing, leather work and gardening.—Montreal Witness.

North Carolina will vote on state prohibition on May 26th.

A much needed change in the immigration station at Ellis Island has been effected. This station accommodates for the night a greater average of guests than the Waldorf-Astoria and Astor hotels combined. Heretofore the dormitories—long, dark rooms, with scant light and air—were fitted with beds and blankets which it was almost impossible to keep clean. Now these have been displaced by small, light, well-ventilated, clean rooms finished in white tile and paint, whereas of only one nationality are largely assigned to a room. The dining-room and kitchen are also light and cheerful, every precaution against disease and facility for cleanliness being employed. The station is now a credit to the nation and an illustration of efficient public service.
