WE AGREE WITH BROTHER HOFER.

For many years there has been a tendency of the officials of the postoffice department to cripple the press.

We have for some time thought that the postoffice department, for the last fifteen years, has erroneously interpreted the laws relating to the public press.

Many publishers approve of the late ruling, so far as their own business is concerned, but there is a principle at stake which ought not to yield to any price.

Advocacy of this principle is persistently pressed with three prime objects in view:

First, to unite publishers in a common cause against any encroachment upon our sacred, constitutional and lawful rights.

Second, to secure the passage of a law that will interpret itself, in the place of those we now have, which are capable of as many interpretations as there are publications in the United States.

Third, to convince the officials of the postoffice department, the president, and congress, by arguments that cannot be answered, and by the invincible logic of facts, that their line of duty leads directly to the complete emancipation of the public press from government espionage, interference or control.

While the postoffice department has been cutting down the privileges of newspapers to circulate at pound rates; and to mail sample copies, there has been a tendency of all departments to work the press.

To-day all the departments and functions of the government from the president down work, or try to work, the press. Every mail under franking privilege bring circulars and editorials that we are asked to publish free.

If the Capital Journal printed all the stuff sent to it by the clerks and press agents of the federal government it would be a mere echo of officialism extending and perpetuating itself.

The individual would be educated to become a mere educated reflex of the red-tape departments, when the government under free institutions, should be a reflex of the citizenship.

We believe with Jefferson that the government should be the tail of the dog—not the whole thing. The men and women of our country are the big thing.

We want to make this point clear, that this newspaper will not become a mere echo of government, of institutions, a mere reflex of political machines, a mere parasite of privileges. It will be a newspaper for human rights.

GOOD ROADS.

There is not a man, woman or child in this section who does not desire good roads, and while it is easy to get them, strange as it appears, we don't. Some may say, "Its easier said than done," and in one respect they are eminently correct. Yet 'tis simple. Here is the way to secure good roads: Make them. To do this, we admit, is an expensive undertaking, but economical in the long run, for when once made they require little attention, time or money. We are now expending on our roads enough in ten years' time to macadamize them, but this is not done because so many taxpayers will not view the situation and the economical side of the question in the true light.

They can afford it, but feel as if they are abused by the mere mention of such a project. Our attention has been called to an article published in a section of Virginia where the people are paupers compared with the people of this section of Oregon. This article refers to the building of several miles of macadam road 12 to 16 feet in width, 6 inches deep after rolling, at cost of from \$1655.13 to \$4015.22 per mile. These figures staggered the supervisors but they decided, nevertheless, to do the work. That's ambition, progress real road-making. The same thing can be done here. All that is necessary is to get right to work and do it. This hemming and hawing will not give us what we must have to surmount our greatest drawback. Neither will "hot air" throughout the year give us what we need. Nothing will remedy a rotten condition but to get to work and macadamize—do it right, regardless of expense, which would mean a saving for the future.—Woodburn Independent.
