Voting on Prohibition.

The question, "Shall the Sale of Liquor be Prohibited in Jackson County, as a Whole," is one that will be voted on at the coming election. Considerable misunderstanding of this question seems to exist in this precinct and the Herald wishes to place the matter fairly before all voters in order that they may vote intelligently.

The vote is to be taken on the county as a whole. If a majority of the voters of the county vote for prohibition, the entire county will be "wet." If, on the other hand, a majority of the voters of the county vote against prohibition, then such precincts of the county as have cast a majority vote against prohibition will be "wet," while all precincts which cast a majority vote for prohibition will be "dry." To illustrate: If the county as a whole goes "wet," and if Medford as a precinct goes "wet," Medford is "wet," but if Central Point as a precinct goes "dry," then Central Point is "dry." But if the county as a whole goes "dry," and Jacksonville as a precinct goes "wet," Jacksonville is "dry" anyway.

Imprisoned by a Pig.

Imprisoned by an enraged pig with but the frail protection from his maddened prey of a light runabout which was unmanageable because of another pig clogging the gears, was the thrilling experience of a prominent Medford motor-car enthusiast who was enjoying a spin on the Ashland road Sunday in his new car. The pig was running in mad circles about the car, infuriated by the squeals of its mate, who was being crushed in the machinery, owing to the inadvertence of the driver of the machine.
