THE UNLUCKY THIRTEEN, OLD SUPERSTITION.

It is usually stated that the superstitious objection to sitting thirteen at a table in Christian countries was based on the fact of the last supper, when Christ and His twelve disciples sat down to eat together immediately before the Savior was seized by his enemies, according to House-keeper.

But in the Norse mythology, which is supposed to antedate the introduction of Christianity among the Northmen, we find the superstition referred to in the fact that a banquet of the gods of Loki the spirit of mischief intruded itself, making thirteen at the table, whereof there was a fight, and Balder, a young hero especially loved by all the gods, was killed. For the fact is, the objection to this number seems to have existed even before Christianity. Among the Turks the number is so disliked and feared that it is never named; with the Aztecs, the Aborigines of Mexico, it was believed to have magic power, and a like fancy has been found in other Indian tribes.

Among the ignorant blacks of the South the fear of this number in any connection is actually absurd, but whether they have borrowed this idea from their imperfect knowledge of Christianity, or whether it is a survival of the voodoo worship of their ancestors it is impossible to say, for the superstition has a strong hold everywhere, even among those who should know better than to be swayed by it. In Italy it is never used in making up the numbers of the favorite lotteries, and in Paris it is omitted in numbering the houses on the street.

The Oregon Grange.

The meeting of the State Grange was held at Eugene last week. The annual report of Master Buxton shows that the total membership of the Grange in the state at the present time is, in round numbers, 8000 and there are 123 organizations.

The two largest Granges are Evening Star Grange and Russellville Grange both in Multnomah County, with a membership of 301 and 175, respectively. Master Buxton recommended several changes in the initiative law as follows: A provision that no bill can be initiated unless it first goes to the Legislature in order that it may be given more publicity by the press and that it may be more thoroughly discussed and understood by the voters; that no remuneration shall be allowed for obtaining signatures to an initiative petition; that a majority vote be necessary to make an amendment. He also recommended an amendment giving the state the right to control water rights. He favored the accounting system for all public officials and favored education on denatured alcohol. A resolution was introduced later on the water-right question, and it was referred to a committee. It will probably be adopted later on in the meeting. State Engineer Lewis is expected about Thursday to speak upon the subject.

Resolutions on the following subjects were introduced and referred to committees without debate: Opposing the single tax; favoring the right of recall; favoring a National highway commission; opposing the Reddy bill giving municipalities the power to make their own charters. A resolution was adopted by the convention favoring the equal-suffrage amendment.

Reform News.

This column is edited by the press superintendent of the W. C. T. U. of Central Point, Oregon.

May 9th The British and Chinese governments have arranged that the annual exportation of opium from India to China shall be decreased 5,100 chests. The trade will thus cease in ten years. The date of the National W. C. T. U. Convention to be held in Denver has been changed to October 23-25.

Several months ago a missionary conference was held at Chentu, in Western China, which adopted as its ideal "one Protestant Christian Church" for Western China. The Episcopalians, Quakers, Baptists and Methodists agree to receive each others members by transfer. Union is already established in educational work; now one printing establishment serves all the missionaries; also a union hymnal has been in use for years. Could not Christian America learn from its Chinese converts?

An article published by the North American Review for January entitled "Passing of Polygamy" and written by Reed Smoot contains among others the following misstatement: "The Senate inquiry established clearly that polygamous marriages in Utah became a thing of the past more than sixteen years ago and no polygamous relations assumed since 1890 have received the sanction of the church." Contrarily it was fully established that numbers of known instances of polygamous marriages have taken place since 1890. Concerning the churches sanction, the majority report of the Senate committee of investigation contains these paragraphs: "It is morally impossible that all these violations of all the laws of the state of Utah by the contracting of plural marriages could have been committed without the knowledge of the first presidency and the twelve apostles of the Mormon Church."

"Indeed, there was no denial on the part of the first president or the twelve apostles that they learned of the fact that plural marriages were being contracted by officials of the Mormon Church and that no attention was paid to the matter." Strange Mr. Smoot so stoutly opposes the anti-polygamy amendment since its requirements are now observed
