ENFORCE THE LAW.

The people of Jackson County have spoken on the question of prohibition of the liquor traffic and with no uncertain voice, with the result that the county has gone "dry" by an overwhelming majority. In this decision of the people the Herald cheerfully acquiesces, because it believes in the principles of government by the people. The writer believes the present so-called local option law to be an unfair law, drawn with the studied intention of giving one side of the controversy the best of the deal, and he has very grave doubts of any ultimate good coming from such a law. However, it is the law, and the result of Monday's election makes it unlawful after the first day of next July for any person to sell, barter or give away, within the confines of Jackson County, a single drop of intoxicating liquor to be used as a beverage. It therefore becomes the duty of every citizen—and in a way, perhaps, especially of every citizen who voted for prohibition—to see to it that the law is absolutely enforced.

Unless the result of Monday's election has had the hitherto unheard of effect of completely changing human nature in a day, this will mean that the battle against "King Alcohol" has just begun and that a strenuous campaign may be expected for the next couple of years. If the law is to be upheld and its efficacy vindicated, every blind pig and every bootlegger must be ferreted out, captured, convicted and put behind the bars. So far as the writer has been able to learn, this result never has been accomplished, but that is no reason why the people of Jackson County should fail to make the attempt at law enforcement here. Better it is not to have the law than to have it trampled underfoot and a spirit of lawlessness and contempt for all law engendered. By all means let the law be enforced to the letter, no matter what the cost in time, labor and money.

EVERYBODY BOOST.

Now that the election is over, the best thing for every citizen of Central Point to do is to get in and boost for a bigger and better Central Point. As a business proposition the issues of the late campaign cut but little figure with us anyway. The town has been "dry" for four years and if the result of Monday's election will make it "DRY" in fact as well as in name it will be a blessing to everybody. The town has grown under prohibition and there is no reason why it should not continue to grow in the future. A particular kind of "dryness" which is now and has been most afflicting us is the lack of a good supply of water for fire protection, irrigation of lawns, street sprinkling and domestic purposes, and the proper thing to do at this time is for the town officials to get busy and submit the water bonding proposition to the people without further delay. Let's go after and get plenty of water and we will get along beautifully without the booze, and on this proposition the town can easily unite and make it unanimous.

Reform News.

May 29.

The United States Court in New York City recently awarded a saleswoman, Miss Frances Wynne, \$6,000 to be paid by the Lydia E. Pinkham Medicine Co. for the unauthorized publication of her portrait and testimonial. The Outlook comments in part, "This verdict should be widely welcomed. Patent medicine makers who obtain their advertising material by such methods as were revealed in this case, by their own actions arouse suspicion, amounting to practical certainty of the worthlessness of their remedies. The advertisement of such concerns are, happily, more and more being strictly excluded from the pages of reputable journals. Any blow which can be dealt to this disgraceful class in its most sensitive spot—the pocket—is a stroke for decency and good order."

The recent attempt to restore the bar to Soldiers' Homes was defeated, the vote in the House being an overwhelming majority against the canteen (46 for and 167 against) and the Senate taking but two hours to pass the bill. Several weeks ago the Senate passed a bill which prohibits racetrack gambling in the District of Columbia. It was laid on the table in the House; there was much fear that it might rest there permanently, but it was finally called from its long rest on May 11th and passed by that body. The Benning races will henceforth be conducted without the financial drain upon clerks and others of the District that has been so deplorable in the past.

The mints are making the necessary changes in the dies to restore the words "In God we trust" to United States coins.

On July 1st U. S. gaugers will begin to mark all vessels containing liquor with the real name of its contents. Concealings of drugs colored with caramel will no longer bear the mark "Pure Whiskey" but must carry the word "Imitation." This is to be done in accordance with instructions of President Roosevelt to Secretary Cortelyou.

The Methodist Episcopal General conference sent a commission of twenty-four clergymen and laymen to urge the importance and constitutionality of the Littlefield Interstate Commerce bill upon Speaker Cannon. Gov. Hanby of Indiana, Gov. Hoch of Kansas, and Judge Palloet of North Dakota, were three of the twenty-four. The speaker is uncompromisingly against the bill, and no known results are reported. One member of the commission remarked, "The M. E. constituency has recognized that Speaker Cannon is blocking this legislation and that this bill would pass overwhelmingly if it were permitted to come to a vote of the House." This bill, the reader will remember, is designed to stop the shipment of liquor into prohibition territory.
