LET'S HAVE A SALES DAY.

Many towns all over the Northwest have within the past few months inaugurated "sales days" one Saturday in each month being set apart for that purpose. The plan is for all of the merchants of the town to make special low prices on some certain line of goods for each sales day, while public auctions are held for the sale of livestock, farm products or any other articles that the farmers of the surrounding country may wish to dispose of. The plan has worked well in every instance and has not only brought trade to the merchants of the town but has also given the farmers and other citizens an opportunity of disposing of many articles which they might want to turn into cash. It also gives the people an opportunity of becoming acquainted with their neighbors and in many ways, socially financially, etc., the scheme has proved worth while. In most places some attractions are provided in the way of ball games or other sports or some of the many traveling amusement features which are readily obtainable for such occasions.

The Herald believes such a project would be a success in Central Point, and this paper would suggest that the local Grange take the matter up at its next meeting and appoint a live committee to interview the local merchants and other business men on the subject. The town has no organization for the promotion of such projects and it would be a good thing for the live farmers who compose the membership of the local Grange to show the town people how to do things.

By all means let us have a sales day. It will pay in many ways and will not only help the town, but the entire community.

"GETTING BACK TO OUR BASE OF SUPPLIES."

Under the caption of "Getting Back to our Base of Supplies," in the Craftsman for June, a writer takes up the subject of the decline of agriculture and asserts that to restore it to its proper prestige in the country is a matter which is attracting the attention of many of the economists. It is the most important industry of their all and should be so regarded. The writer quoted says our ambition is boundless and our commercial and industrial expansion has been phenomenal, but nevertheless we find ourselves at the present time in the position of an army which has allowed itself to be cut off from its base of supplies. We have been so intent upon conquest, that we have failed to keep open our line of retreat—a fatal oversight in commercial, as it is in military advance. Thus far, backed by widely varied and generally favorable climates, the best soils in the world, and abundant production of all the natural food supplies, we have never had to consider the question of scarcity. On the contrary, we have not only had enough and to spare for ourselves, but have always been able and ready to go to the relief of other nations suffering from famine.

But now we are confronting the fact that we shall soon have 20,000,000 of people to support and that the price of foodstuffs of all kinds is almost prohibitive because the market is

Reform News.

July 4. The Temperance Congress at Saratoga Springs, N. Y., which took the form of a Centennial to Billy J. Clark, the founder of the first temperance society, is reported a great success. All temperance societies and church committees were invited to be represented, and sent of their best. Everywhere temperance sentiment is advancing and the W. C. T. U. slogan, "The Nation's Going Dry," will soon read, "The World is Going Dry." A marked change from the aim of the Billy J. Clark society to that of the present day society is noteworthy. The scope of the first was to induce moderation in the use of intoxicants. Expressed in the founder's own words to his pastor Lebbeus Armstrong, "Sir, we shall become a community of drunkards if something is not speedily done to arrest the progress of intemperance!" Science having taught us that the evil effects from the moderate and excessive uses of intoxicants differ only in degree, the aim of the temperance movement now is total abstinence from intoxicants and narcotics. The addresses were one continuous recital of achievements by temperance forces, supported by facts and figures. The methods differ, but not the aim. The results differ only in the height reached—all report victories. "Thanks be to God, who giveth us the victory."

The servant problem is truly a great problem in this bountiful land of ours. Someone suggests that the "human relationship" which existed between master and man and mistress and maid has been largely eliminated and in its place is a mere buying and selling of labor. Some weeks ago a letter was published in the New York Evening Post, concerning a lady who had recently died, and signed "Her Sorrowing Servants." She seems to have kept alive the "human relationship" with these servants. This is one of many tributes. "We, her servants, wish to emphasize our feelings toward one whose memory we can never forget, one whose equal we do not expect to meet again in our life of labor. There is a silent sorrow in this home; also among those who claim no natural ties to kind them to the dead, but surely ties only a little less. The one great task pervading us is the recital of the motherly kindness and consideration experienced by each and all while in her service."

cornered by trusts or by stock gamblers in Wall street or the Pit, but because the sources of supply are too far removed from the commercial centers and production is insufficient for the needs of the population.

Such a state of affairs seems absurd in a country of such vast extent, where the natural resources are almost boundless, but nevertheless it exists, and it has been brought about largely by our own neglect and wastefulness. We have formed our population into a huge army which exists solely for commercial and industrial conquest, and each individual is so bent upon immediate gain that the larger necessity of providing sufficient supplies has been lost sight of. We have allowed ourselves to drift away from our base of supplies, a lack of forethought for which the individual citizen is no less responsible than the leaders of the great organizations who have made possible our commercial prestige.

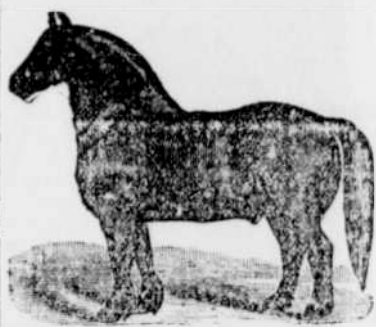
