SLEEP--A VICE.

The mere statement that sleeping is an extraneous habit and not essential to the well being of the human machinery, recently attributed to Thomas E. Edison is not particularly convincing, says an exchange. It is a most attractive theory, indeed, but the average man with duties to perform from day to day will be willing to accept it as such, and without attempting to improve his diurnal routine. There is also a popular hypothesis that the taking of nutrition is a habit, or fad, but no one has ever lived to prove the fact.

Mr. Edison says that in prehistoric days when the world was cast in perpetual night, men acquired the vice of sleeping--primarily, because they would have bored themselves insufferable by remaining continually senseless, there being really nothing of interest to behold or undertake. When the universal gloom lifted a bit, the inhabitants of the globe had become addicted to the habit of going to bed at frequent intervals, and although they might have staid up without restful interludes from infancy to old age, they could not shake the old notion that sleep was included in the cosmic scheme. They foolishly slept nights, thereby losing about a third of their none too extended lives.

Mr. Edison makes a serious charge against mankind. Since the birth of Christ the world has wasted nearly 700 years. The fourteenth century should have produced flying machines, and automobiles, and dreadnoughts, and the commission form of city government, while by the natural progression of things, we should now have reached the stage of development which will not be attained until the twenty-fifth century. And all because of a false idea which circumstances hammered into the protoplasmic brains of our forefathers ages ago.

The great inventor avers that it is not yet too late to amend our benighted ways. Begin by sleeping fewer hours each night, he urges, and eventually the unnatural desire for rest will vanish. If the scientist has made a bona fide discovery he is entitled to the gratitude of this and succeeding generations for the finest gift that was ever bestowed by one human being upon another--twenty additional years in which to take pleasure from the world. It is a pity Mr. Edison is such a joker.

PERILS OF MERCHANTS.

The real danger of managing a store nowadays is that it will get into a rut. The merchant who is afraid to "make a noise," who dreads the day his bills fall due; who is afraid to "spare money for advertising," who devotes most of his time to watching little things, to worrying about trifles--he is in danger.

In effect, he is trying to found and build his store on his fears, not on his aspiration; on misgivings, not on confidence. He forgets that fear is a destroyer--not a builder; that misgivings will pull down that which confidence would build to completion.

It is a dangerous thing to fetter a store with a lot of baseless fears of what might happen; to dread what might follow the exercise of ordinary aggressiveness and enterprise. Under such conditions the merchant's policy

itself is the very worst calamity that could happen to the store.

Such a policy places a store in the position of depending upon "location," chances of various kinds, and upon the patronage of those people who do not read advertising. These, however, are so scarce in this city that if they all patronized one store they could not support it.

The merchant who advertises adequately builds upon his hopes, not upon his fears. Confident and aggressive advertising makes store management a business fit for men--men of nerve, resources, red blood.--Roseburg News.
