E. H. Harriman did not come to Medford last week as expected on account of being obliged to remain at Pelican Bay to entertain an old friend of his, Mr. R. U. Matism. Governor Chamberlain, Fred E. Stanley and J. P. O'Brien came in, however, and enjoyed the luncheon prepared by the Medford people and served at Rogue River, as much as Mr. Harriman could possibly have done. Governor Chamberlain reported that Mr. Harriman is much interested in the development of the Crater Lake region and all of that section of Eastern and Central Oregon, now without transportation facilities, and that the magnate agreed to act as chairman of a commission to be appointed by the Governor to gether funds for the building of a first-class automobile road from Central Point to Crater Lake and on to Klamath Falls. The Governor is enthusiastic over the wonders and beauties of the lake, and announces that if he is elected senator he will work for a continuing appropriation for improvements in the Crater Lake park.
