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ROOSEVELT AND THE SENATORSHIP

"I am for the people ruling and I want you to be senator."

When President Roosevelt in these words greeted Governor Chamberlain last week at the White House he voiced the sentiment of honest, patriotic citizens all over this nation. The president frankly declared in the same breath that he would have preferred to see Oregon elect a Republican senator, but the people of the state had spoken and he bowed to their decision as final and indisputable. With his customary outspoken directness he made it unmistakably clear that he lends no countenance to the efforts to debauch the Oregon legislature and to induce Statement No. 1 legislators to repudiate their pledges to the people. And the attitude of the president is the attitude of honest men and honest newspapers all over these United States.

Apparently the president did not pause to consider the "constitutionality" of the manner in which the people of Oregon had expressed their choice for senator; he does not seem to have given a thought to the excuses by which Statement No. 1 legislators might wriggle out of performance of their pledge; he was quite untroubled by the dangers which might threaten the Republican party in consequence of obeying the people's will.

It is enough for Roosevelt that the voters of Oregon have named Chamberlain as their choice for senator. He accepts the people's decision as that of the court of last appeal. He "wants Chamberlain to be senator" because the people of Oregon want him, and that is all that the president cares to know.

We commend President Roosevelt's attitude to the consideration of those men and those newspapers in Oregon that are leagued in the effort to prevent Chamberlain's election and to plunge the state once more into the mire of debauchery and corruption which marked senatorial elections in the past.—Portland Journal.

THE TAFT BIG STICK.

It begins to look as if Taft were going to interfere in purely local affairs even to a greater degree than did Roosevelt. There is no complaint made against Roosevelt, perhaps, which has caused him the loss of so many friends as his meddling with small matters and his delving into the affairs that belong more particularly to the states. Taft may well beware the blandishments of those who seek to entice him into taking their side of these affairs, for there is invariably another side and so certain as he takes the one side he will lose the good will of the other.

Timothy Woodruff was a candidate for United States senator from New York. Taft, it had been announced, is in favor of Root. Woodruff took dinner with Taft a few days ago. Immediately after the dinner it was announced that Woodruff had withdrawn from the race as senator and would leave Root a clear field. Satisfactory arrangements may have been made between Taft and Woodruff, but those arrangements will not satisfy all the friends of Woodruff with the result that both Woodruff and Taft will lose by the trade.

Oregon republicans who believe the legislature should repudiate the express commands of

the people relative to the election of Chamberlain as United States senator, have appealed to Taft. There is no announcement yet that Taft will interfere. but if he should he could not help but shake the confidence the people of Oregon have in him.

The people of New York, the people of Oregon and the people of all other states should be allowed to work out their own salvation without suggestion or influence from a source so high as that of the president of the United States who certainly can find enough business of national importance to keep him busy.—Boise (Idaho) Capital News.
