THE CRATER LAKE PROJECT.

The bill which has been introduced in the legislature asking for an appropriation for the Crater Lake wagon road is one that should have the hearty support of all of Southern Oregon.

There is but one crater lake in the world and all who have visited that scenic spot agree that it is one of the greatest natural wonders of the world. It has already proven a great attraction to tourists who come to the Coast, and last season many thousands of people visited the lake in spite of the physical discomforts and heavy expense that is incident to the trip on account of the primitive roads and lack of proper accommodations for travelers. The past travel to the lake, however, will be but a drop in the bucket as compared with the future travel if the spot is once made accessible to the hundreds of thousands of people who pass through this valley every Summer bent on sightseeing and a pleasant outing.

Jackson County could have no better business asset than a first-class automobile road to Crater Lake, and it is proper that the state should assist generously in the work of construction, because what helps one section of Oregon help the entire state.

The people of Jackson County should see to it that a strong delegation is kept at Salem to look after this bill and to urge the legislature to pass it to a law.

FISHING IN THE ROGUE.

Rogue River fishing is one of the great attractions of this section of the state. Anglers of national reputation have traveled across the continent to enjoy the fine trout and steelhead fly fishing in that stream and which they all declare to be among the very finest in the United States.

Because of lack of legal protection to the fish in Rogue River they are about to be exterminated, and if such a calamity should occur, the Rogue River valley will lose one of its best attractions.

A bill has been presented to the legislature proposing to limit net and trap fishing on lower Rogue River to a short season and prohibiting all fishing on the upper Rogue reaches to the rod and line. All Southern Oregonians should give this bill their hearty support, for it means much to this section of the state to have it become a law and to have the game fish of the river protected and propagated.

The bill of Senator Bingham providing for the amendment of the tax law and providing for the publication of the delinquent tax list as formerly is one that should become a law. It is one in which every taxpayer is vitally interested, because in case of his property becoming delinquent from any cause he has no means of learning that fact until after finding that the property has been sold. There is a general demand among the people for the passage of this amendment; and if the people will write a line to their senator and representatives asking them to support the measure it will do doubt become a law. The bill provides that the rate for publishing tax lists shall not exceed the rate allowed under the old law, which was 25 cents per line for the full five insertions. This amendment is not designed as a graft for the newspapers nor for anybody else, but

Farm and Garden

GATE FOR THE SNOWDRIFT.

Simple Plan For Open Way In and Out.

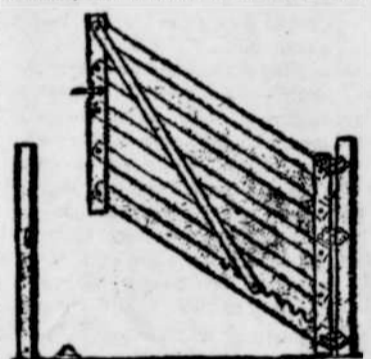
There is no snow cleaning in the country. The farmer breaks his way through the drifts with difficulty. There is more play for the winds in the country than there is in the city, and when the snow accumulates the wind drifts impede travel and clog the ways about the farm. The gateway must be kept clear because that is the way in as well as the way out. Unless the gate is constructed in a manner that will readily yield to the

impediments it is about as good as no gate. In the plan suggested herewith is a partial solution of the difficulty which so often confronts the farmer at this season of the year. Two cuts are pictured. They show a gate which can be readily adjusted in case of snowdrifts.

It is easily made from ordinary lumber. A 1 by 6 upright is used for the two lower boards, 1 by 4 for the upper ones. The uprights at the hinge post are double 1 by 4, one piece outside and the other inside the bars. The upright at the latch side may be the same weight of stuff or slightly lighter and fastened in the same way. Instead of nailing the bars to these uprights, bolts are used, one for each bar at each end. The lowest board is notched, as shown, and the double

brace used from the top of the latch post to the bottom of the hinge post. For the braces 1 by 3 stuff is strong enough. These may be held in place at the top by a single bolt. They are joined near the bottom with a bolt which engages with the notches when the gate is raised, as shown in the cut.
