Rebuilding Fishway on Ament Dam.

Under the supervision of Deputy fish warden Clanton, a force of workmen were put to work last week rebuilding the fishway at the Ament dam across Rogue river near Grants Pass. The new fishway will a 50-foot channel cut around the south side of the dam and will be finished with cement. It will take about two months to complete it.

The fishway at this dam has been the source of much trouble and expense to the state for the past few years owing to the illegal fishing that has been done there since seining has been permitted in Josephine county, and it was not until the appointment of H. A. McAllister as Master Fish Warden, that there was any attention paid to it. It is hoped that the new fishway will stop this trouble.
