The Small States.

The area of Maryland is 12,210 square miles, 2,350 square miles of which are water. There are seven states in the Union which have a smaller area—viz, every New England state except Maine and New Jersey and Delaware. The gross area of none of these states equals the land area of Maryland.

China's Coal.

In China there is twenty times as much coal as in all Europe.

A Famous Ink.

A famous ink long used in Germany was made of a combination of chromate of potash with a solution of logwood in the proportions of one part of the former to a thousand parts of the latter.

Horseshoe Graves.

The horseshoe in China as well as in other countries is looked upon as a harbinger of good luck. For that reason Chinese mandarins when buried have horseshoe graves.

Corks.

It is a good plan to keep on hand a supply of corks in assorted sizes. Twenty-five cents' worth will often last a year or more, and much time and trouble as well as food material will be saved. Corks have a way of disappearing from vinegar and molasses jugs on their journeys to and from the grocer's, and in opening bottles containing condiments and liquids the corkscrew often tears the cork to pieces.

Stenciled Playing Cards.

During the fifteenth century playing cards were executed by means of stencil plates. There are now few of these cards in existence, and they are very valuable.

Chemical Inks.

The manuscripts of the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries are in many cases almost illegible on account of the fading of the ink. At that time the lamp-black inks passed out of use and chemical inks became popular.

Rings in Norway.

In every rank of life in Norway young men and maidens exchange rings on becoming engaged. These rings are worn by the men as well as the women for the rest of their lives.

The Open Top Tree.

It is not necessary to go over the tree trying to cut off every little twig. The leaders are the ones that need attention. When heading in these leaders it is best to cut them off to a side branch rather than to dormant bud. Frequently when an inexperienced man practices heading in he is tempted to shear the tree all over and leave it a smooth, oval form. It will be seen that this is very different from the method described above, where only the leaders are cut back and the side shoots thinned so as to leave an open top. The amount of heading in to be done should vary from year to year, according as the crop promises to be large or small. As the tree gets older less heading in is usually necessary.

Sugar Beets.

Last year was a banner year for sugar beets, but the estimate is made by the United States department of agriculture that the present year will eclipse all past records, as it is expected that over 500,000 short tons of beet sugar will be made.
