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## Timber Sale Will Help County Treasury

M. L. Erickson, Supt. of the Crater National Forest, returned Tuesday evening from the Pelican Bay section in Klamath county, where he has been for the past two months or more cruising a large body of timber to be sold by the government.

This cruising stunt was done entirely on snow shoes and included the making of contour maps of the whole region, showing the different elevations, the character and quality of the forest growth and everything else pertaining to the timber, its accessibility and value.

The township cruised shows 85,000,000 feet of standing timber. It has been estimated at 150,000,000. The contractor is to remove this amount in five years and pays the government a certain amount per 1000 feet.

Of the remuneration received by the government, 25 per cent goes to the counties in which the reserve is situated in proportion to the area of forest lands in the respective counties. In this case Jackson county will receive 60 per cent of the amount coming and Klamath county 40 per cent, that being about the proportion of timber lands in the Crater National reserve in each county.

Jackson county's share will be in the neighborhood of \$33,550 payable in five years, which will help some in school and road funds.

## Uncle Joe Cannon Shorn of His Power

After seven years as absolute dictator of the lower house of congress and by virtue of that fact the equal if not the superior of the president himself in dictating the policy of the government, Joseph G. Cannon, speaker of the house was on last Saturday shorn of his autocratic power by the adoption of a resolution providing for the election by the house of the committee on rules and prohibiting the speaker from being a member of that committee. The resolution was adopted by the decisive vote of 191 ayes to 155 nays, the insurgent republicans and democrats voting together.

The final fight was precipitated on Friday unexpectedly. A vote was taken on an unimportant question in which the democrats and insurgents developed unexpected strength when immediately the Norris resolution was sprung and the fight was on. All night the session lasted and all of the following day until late in the afternoon when the final vote was taken.

Following the announcement of the vote Speaker Cannon arose to a question of personal privilege and addressed the members. He showed fight to the last and announced that he would not resign as speaker as that would indicate weakness or that he felt himself to be in the wrong. He would, however, be glad to entertain a motion to elect a new speaker in his place. Following his remarks, which hurled defiance at his enemies in every word, a resolution was introduced declaring the office of speaker vacant and calling for the election of a new speaker but it was lost by a vote of 155 ayes to 191 nays. The resolution adopted provides that the committee on rules shall consist of ten members six from the majority party and four from the minority the speaker being debarred from being a member.

Cannon's rule has been absolute and has been used to crush every member of his own party who did not do his bidding without question. It has also been used to further legislation wanted by the "system" and because of that independent republican members who regarded the interests of the people as of more importance than those of the corporations, revolted and overthrew him.

Cannonism is dead. What will be the name of the next system for controlling legislation.
