Forests and Climate.

A recent report by Professor Moore, chief of the weather bureau, upon the influence of forests on climate and on the run off of water is of interest and value at this time. In some respects Professor Moore antagonizes popular belief. He holds that the cutting away of the forests is not invariably followed by harmful results, because their existence has nothing to do with the precipitation of rainfall. Floods, he says, are caused by a precipitation, the source of which is vapor floating too high in the air to be affected by the conditions of the surface air.

Forestry advocates insist that forests do exercise a marked influence on droughts, floods and on precipitation. On the other hand, authorities of equal experience believe that broken, cultivated and permeable soil covered a large part of the year with growing grasses and cereals are quite as effectual in conserving rainfall as trees. The report is assuring in that it banishes fear of calamity on account of the reckless forest cutting of the past. But it is far from the last word upon the wisdom if not the necessity of reasonable forest conservation from this time forward.

The income tax amendment is clearly defective in that its meaning is sharply challenged and disputed before its adoption. When a constitutional amendment is submitted for adoption there ought certainly to be a pretty general agreement as to what it will do if passed.
