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CAPTAIN M. F. EGGLESTON.

In the death of Captain M. F. Eggleston, which occurred last Saturday morning at Salem, Jackson county loses one of her most progressive, respected and useful citizens.

For almost two decades a resident of this county and during that time always an active participant in public affairs and a leader in all measures calculated to advance modern ideas and progressive methods in the development of this valley. Captain Eggleston's personality and trained mentality has left an impress that will live long after his physical body has returned to dust.

Born on an Indiana farm and educated at the West Point military academy, from which institution he graduated in 1877, he served for ten years as an officer in the army. Tiring of military life, he resigned from the army and took up civil pursuits in this county, and it may be said of him that he made good in practically every undertaking. He served the city of Ashland for many years as city recorder, city attorney and in other public capacities and was probably the strongest factor in that community in bringing about modern conditions in civic affairs. He was elected to the legislature last November and since the opening of the present session he ably served the people of this county until almost the very day of his death. His ability was recognized in his appointment to some of the most important committees and in the organization he was second strongest man in the contest for the speakership.

Captain Eggleston had many warm personal friends in Central Point. Three years ago he drafted a new charter for this city and his long experience in municipal affairs at Ashland made his advice and counsel of inestimable value to us in helping to throw off the fetters of old-time conservatism and in bringing about an awakening among our people to the needs and possibilities of modern conditions. His passing to another plane will be as sincerely regretted as will his memory be lovingly cherished by many loyal friends.

Among the many bills introduced in the legislature during the week is one providing for the closing of all places of business except drug stores, restaurants and hotels, on Sunday, says the Jacksonville Post. If the provisions of the bill are such as stated in the daily papers it should be promptly turned down. The person who wishes to desist from labor on Sunday has a perfect right to do so and his wishes should be respected, but to attempt to tie up all business, travel, etc., because of the prejudice of a few narrow minds is preposterous. We do not believe that the people of Oregon want such a law.

A writer in Success Magazine for February shows up the fallacy of too many churches in a community. He cites instances of towns in Massachusetts having a population as small as 1,000 which have five or six churches, some of them with not over 30 or 40 members. As a result of this "churchianity" there is very little Christianity in the community, according to this writer, who goes on to point out that the cause of Christianity suffers by this over-organization, in that a spirit of bitterness between the different churches prevails.

YOUR CREDIT IS GOOD

TAFT PARDONS SOCIALIST.

For offering a reward of \$1000 to anyone who would kidnap ex-Governor Taylor, of Kentucky, who was under indictment in that state for alleged complicity in the murder of Governor Gobel and who for years had been a fugitive from justice, Fred D. Warren, editor of the socialist Appeal to Reason, was arrested and prosecuted by the United States Government and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$1500 and to serve six months in jail. And this, in spite of the fact that only a few months before this offer of reward was made, the Supreme Court of the United States rendered a decision in the now famous Moyer-Haywood case that kidnapping was no crime and that these workmen and miners' union officials, who were only accused of crime, had no recourse, when high officials of Idaho and Colorado conspired to drag them from one state to another at night by armed force and without legal warrant.

The trial of Warren was a farce from first to last, it being evident that the whole thing was a case of persecution for the sake of partisanship rather than prosecution for the sake of justice.

After Warren's conviction the press and people of the country raised such a storm of protest that the government was in a quandary how to let go of the case and finally a republican congressman back in Kansas asked President Taft for a pardon on his

own motion and it was granted.

Warren was innocent of any crime and his entire bearing throughout the case has been such as to make monkeys of the federal court judges and lawyers who were prosecuting him and to win all but universal sympathy for himself while advancing the cause of socialism, to which he is devoted, in a wonderful degree.

Mr. Pickwick, who was a respectable and withal a very conservative old gentleman, asserted that "the law is an ass." And who, after following this Warren case, will dispute the claim?
