KEEPING TRADE AT HOME.

Bert R. Greer, a veteran newspaper man from Muskogee, Oklahoma, has purchased the Ashland Tidings and will conduct that newspaper in the future. Mr. Greer gives evidence of being a live wire and there is every reason to believe that he will give the people of Ashland a stirring paper that will not be satisfied with conditions as they were twenty years ago today, nor as they are today, next week, next month or next year.

In a recent editorial in which he stated his reasons for accepting advertising business from Medford merchants he states a lot of bald facts that apply to other towns in the Rogue River valley with equal force as they do Ashland. He says in part:

"The only way to offset the results of enterprise is by enterprise. Exercise the same kind and more of it. That, and that only, will save Ashland trade for Ashland merchants. The Tidings will aid the merchants in this laudable undertaking, but the Tidings cannot do it all alone, and will not attempt it. It can, and does, offer Ashland merchants half the rate it charges their outside competitors. If Medford merchants can afford to take trade away from Ashland by paying twice the advertising rate, Ashland merchants can afford to keep it at home by paying half that rate.

"We have been told that Ashland prices are less than those at Medford for the same qualities. We know this to be true, in some cases at least. We have been reading the ads running in the Tidings, and those merchants who quote prices are offering better bargains than appear in the price-quoting advertisements in the Medford papers. Some Ashland merchants are unable to speak for because we do not know. We have never seen prices quoted in their advertisements. Others do not advertise at all. If non-advertising Ashland merchants are offering better bargains than Medford, so soon as Ashland people find it out they will quit going to Medford to trade. We are sure local people have home pride and loyalty enough to do that."

The effort being made by the American Medical Association to have legislation enacted creating a Department of Health as one of the executive branches of the federal government, is meeting with much opposition all over the country among people of intelligence who are averse to giving any particular school of healing all the say about the treatment of disease. This opposition is becoming crystalized into the National League for Medical Freedom, and a determined fight is being put up against the passage of the Owen bill, which would in effect give to the "regular" or allopathic school of medicine the power to force their particular brand of pills on an already over-drugged public. All other schools of medicine including Homeopaths, Eclectics, Osteopaths, Mental Healers, Christian Scientists and others are uniting in this league and a pretty fight is promised during the present session of congress if the advocates of the objectionable bill continue to urge its passage. Pills and politics would better be kept separate. Either one is a bitter enough dose for the average citizen.
