Bonding Jackson County

Which plan shall it be, Mr. Taxpayer? Shall it be under the old 6 per cent credit scheme and pay two to get one, or shall it be under the up-to-the-minute common sense, progressive Scott cash plan?

There is a movement on foot to bond Jackson county for \$1,500,000 six per cent interest-bearing bonds for the purpose of taking up the outstanding warrants and making the debt a valid one, balance to be used on roads. This arrangement if it could be carried out would give the far-sighted gent who shaved the warrants 10 to 20 per cent. A good cleanup. But as it now stands the interest will be kept in the county whereas if bonds were issued and sold the interest would go out of the county. Moreover, the shark who bought warrants at 90 cents can hold them four and one half years and still realize 8 per cent on his investment of 90 cents.

The Tammany candidate for County Judge, Merrick, stands pledged to the above program. If elected he will use his best efforts to do for the county what he has helped to do for the city of Medford. The taxes in Medford have increased 150 per cent in the last two years. Lots 13 and 14, block 45, taxes in 1910 \$288.57, in 1912 \$742.00. If your taxes are not all ready high enough vote for Merrick.

To those who don't think the Treasury Department issues national bank bills on other than government bonds I wish to say we have one National bank in operation in Jackson county the capital stock of which amounting to \$50,000 is represented by Portland water bonds drawing 5 per cent interest on which security the secretary of the treasury has issued \$50,000 in National bank bills the bonds being deposited with the treasury department.

To illustrate the difference in the stand pat credit scheme and the Scott common sense progressive cash plan: The amount of non-interest bonds issued with taxpayers National bank attachment \$5,300,000, representing the capital stock of the bank fully paid up. Reserve the balance of the assessed valuation of Jackson county, about \$15,000,000, together with the natural resources and the industry, integrity and intelligence of all the people of the county and further guaranteed by every hoof on hill and vane, every blade of grass and every little boy and every little girl. Making it better than ten times the amount of the proposed issue. Amount required to be raised yearly for twenty years \$165,000.00 to retire the issue. Total in twenty years \$3,300,000.00.

Under the interest bearing bond or credit scheme the amount of six per cent interest bearing bonds would be \$1,500,000 to be sold to non-resident bond buyers so that interest and principle amounting to \$3,300,000 have disappeared from Jackson county in twenty years. Amount to be raised yearly: Sinking fund \$75,000 plus \$165,000; interest \$90,000; total in twenty years \$3,300,000.

Under the interest bearing or credit bond scheme we would have \$1,500,000 to build roads and the benefit of the \$75,000 yearly sinking fund to loan. Under the Scott non-interest bond or progressive cash plan we would have to build roads and other public improvements \$3,300,000 and the benefit of the \$165,000 sinking fund to loan.

Now, Mr. Taxpayer, it is up to you. I have tried to make this so clear that a man does not necessarily need to have the D. T.'s to understand it, like the "money and finance" articles now running in the Mail-Tribune by McClure. Mac. fails to take the shoe trust into his calculations. You innocent, to get the exact value of a pair of vici kid shoes trust marked \$6.00, one sheep skin value 10c, with wool removed and made up into vici kid shoes costs 66c. Cost to retailer, \$3.00 to \$3.50 per pair, cost to customer \$6.00. The cost of production has little to do with the selling price. That is absolutely controlled by the quality and price.

The price of potatoes in San Francisco today is \$2.75 per hundred. That does not indicate a shortage of potatoes. It does indicate that the corner on the viable supply within shipping distance is complete and what is not actually sold will be allowed to rot where they are to save freight and towing them out to sea and sinking them to the end that famine prices will prevail and the production that potatoes will be selling at \$5.00 per cwt. be realized.

Last season tomatoes in Portland were 4 1/2 per pound in the front of the store while tons were allowed to spoil in the rear of the same building. No shortage there. Just a gentlemen's agreement to maintain prices. The supply of money nor the supply of either

the potatoes or tomatoes cut any figure. Control is everything.
