

## Comply With Law by using PRINTED Butter Wraps

According to the ruling of the Oregon Dairy and Food Commission all dairy butter sold or exposed for sale in this state must be wrapped in butter paper upon which is printed the words "Oregon Dairy Butter, 16 (or 32) ounces full weight," with the name and address of the maker.

To enable patrons of the Herald to easily comply with this ruling this office has put in a supply of the standard sizes of butter paper and will print it in lots of 100 sheets and upward and deliver it by parcel post at the following prices:

## County School News

### APPLEGATE VALLEY FIELD AND TRACK MEET AT APPLEGATE ABOUT MAY 1

This contest shall be open to any pupil in regular attendance in the schools of Applegate Valley, either Jackson or Josephine Counties, during the year 1916-1917.

"Athletic Rules of the American Athletic Union," published by A. G. Spalding Bros., Portland or San Francisco, and sold for 10 cents a copy, shall govern the rules of conduct so far as applicable.

There are 32 events and each event shall count 9 points, divided as follows: First place, 5 points; second place, 3 points; third place, 1.

The silver cup put up by the Valley Pride Creamery Company in 1915 and now in possession of the Applegate school will be the prize trophy. Appropriate ribbon prizes designating first, second or third place will be given contestants winning those places at this meet.

Not more than two (2) contestants from any one school shall be permitted to enter the same event in any particular class.

No contestant from the Applegate or from the Ruch school shall be permitted to enter more than two track events and two field events; provided any student may enter the relay race regardless of number of other events entered.

No contestant shall be permitted to enter or participate in more than one class.

#### Classes and Events.

Girls—Class "A," those 12 years of age or under on May 1, 1917: 50 yd. dash, all-up Indian club race, basket ball for baskets, basket ball for distance from seven-foot circle.

Girls—Class "B," those 13 or over, on May 1, 1917: 50 yd. dash, all-up Indian club race, basket ball for baskets from 15-foot line, five trials; basket ball for distance from 7-foot circle.

Boys—Class "A," boys 13 years of

age or under, May 1: 50-yard dash, pole vault, run broad jump, shot put, 8 pounds; 100-yard dash; 120-yard hurdle, 24 inches; run high jump, 220-yard run.

Boys—Class "B," all boys 14 or 15 years of age, May 1, 1917: 50-yard dash, shot-put, 8 pounds; run broad jump, 100-yard dash, run high jump, 220-yard run, 120-yard hurdle, 24 inch; pole vault.

Boys—Class "C," boys 16 years of age or over, May 1, 1917: 100-yard dash, run broad jump, shot put, 12 pound; 220-yard run, 440-yard run, run high jump, 120-yard hurdle, 30 inches; pole vault.

Regarding the writing contest which all the rural schools participate in, the papers are coming in promptly and show decided improvement. Teachers, who up-to this time, had not taken the course in Palmer Method are now enrolling for the free course being offered by the A. N. Palmer company.

The time is approaching for the spring examinations. Miss Kay Kincaid's school in Applegate has closed for this year. A number of the rural schools have just opened for the spring term. Miss Mary E. Gore, of Medford has taken the Beaver Creek school. Her term began February 26, as did the school in District 89, which was taken by Miss Mamie Clark. The Colestin school opens April 1, and will be taught by Miss Edna Dahuff, of Ashland. Miss Mae Maltby was to have opened the Long Branch school, but on account of the recent storm the date was changed and is not yet certain.

A local spelling contest is to take place at Talent, Friday, April 13, 1917. The schools taking part are, Talent, Wagner Creek, Valley View and Anderson Creek. All pupils in grades 5, 6, 7 and 8 in the above mentioned schools are to participate. One hundred words to be selected from list A, of the Jackson County spelling contest list are to be used. The grade, and also the

school making the best average for the entire class or school, as the case may be, shall be the winner of the local contest.
