Democracy Drawing Near In Germany

Readjustment and Extension of Popular
Control Favored by Hollweg

Berlin, March 28.—Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg may decide to grant electoral reforms in Germany looking toward increased democracy in the empire before the end of the war, according to a significant hint contained in the Cologne Gazette today.

The Gaette declared that the chancellor's speech of March 14, in which he declared in favor of an extension of popular control and promised such a re adjustment after the war should end, was not made as a result of the revolution in Russia, because it was impossible that he could have heard of the democracy movement there at that time.

Important World News Told in Brief

Washington, D. C. March 21. President Wilson called extra session of congress to meet April 2, and has decided to meet Germany's affront on the high seas with sweeping action.

Portland, Or. March 27. The mobilization of the Third Regiment, Oregon National Guard, was completed today. It has been just six months since the regiment returned from the Mexican border.

April 4. - The senate passed the war resolution by 82 to 6 votes.

April 5. - The War Department handed President Wilson a detailed report of the plans to raise an army of 2,000,000 men if necessary 'to bring the government of the German empire to terms'.

Rome, Italy, Feb. 18.—The literacy test clause of the new immigration law in the United States that goes into effect on May 1, has already resulted in the stimulation of the study of the English language by those Italians hoping to obtain admission into the United States.

Seattle, Wash., March 26.—Preparations for war may cripple athletics at the universities of the Pacific Coast according to Dean Arthur Priest. The mobilization of the National Guard troops in the coast states will take many of the leading athletes of the state universities and other colleges of the coast.

Medford May Have Fine New Hospital

The largest real estate deal in Medford city property in five years was consummated Saturday, according to the Medford Sun, when Dr. E. H. Porter bought from Dr. E. B. Pickle the quarter block opposite the federal building on Sixth and Holly streets, for a consideration of \$6,000. The deal was made through Earl S. Tomy.

Dr. Porter plans the erection immediately upon the site of a private sanitarium and hospital to cost \$15,000. The plans for the buildings are now in the hands of the architect and will be ready early next week.

Other details regarding the new project are in course of formation.
