A flag flown upside down is a signal of distress.

When the fiag is formally raised all present during the ceremony should stand at attention with hand raised to the forehead ready for the salute.

The correct salute to the flag, as required by the regulations of the U.S. army is: Standing at attention raise the right hand to the forehead over the right eye, palm downward, fingers extended and close together, arm at an angle of 45 degrees. Whenever possible, the flag should be flown from a staff or mast, but should not be fastened to the side of a building, platform or scaffolding.


