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## CO-OPERATIVE DEMOCRACY APPLIED TO-DAY

As Geo. W. Perkins has said, the time of "individualism is as dead as a smelt." The 19th century has gone down in history as the age of "individualism"—every man for himself and "the devil take the hindmost." The 20th century thus far is witnessing the transition. Marvelous changes of such far reaching moment as few of us can realize are taking place. The dawn of a new and brighter day is not far distant. Even to-day, above the dark storm clouds, can be seen the faint glow in the eastern sky. Over war-ridden Europe we see, above the smoke and untold horrors of that mad struggle, faintly outlined in the pale red glow of the new morn, "THE NEW ERA," and beneath, "CO-OPERATION." As we read these prophetic words of encouragement and promise, we know that democracy will stand the test of the world war, because true democracy is the brotherhood of man realized—the spirit of co-operation personified. True democracy is true Christianity; the terms are synonymous in the last analysis.

First, I want to say that I believe if the Christian people of this town and community would unite their efforts for practical service to humanity, instead of each separate denomination acting separately and competitively, a change would come over this community that would surprise many of us. It would not be necessary for those not desiring to lose their identity with any certain denomination to do so. If I happen to want to be a Presbyterian still, and you a Methodist, need that matter, if we are sincere?

### Luncheon Dishes.

**JAM OMELET.**—Beat yolks of five eggs light with a tablespoonful of powdered sugar. Into this stir a teaspoonful of cornstarch dissolved in three tablespoonfuls of milk, then the stiffly beaten whites. Cook in a frying pan until set. Spread with strawberry jam, fold and serve as dessert.

**Cream Mushroom Soup.**—Peel and trim a pint of mushrooms and boil them gently until very tender in a pint of water. Then rub through a sieve. Mix a pint of boiling water with a pint of hot milk. Itub together a tablespoonful each of butter and flour and with this thicken the milk and water. Season with salt and pepper and a grating of nutmeg and add the mushroom paste just before serving.

**Curry Leftovers.**—Chop fine any leftovers in the shape of veal, lamb, mutton or fowl. Add an equal quantity of boiled rice or any other cereal that you have on hand and season with salt, pepper, minced parsley, a little onion and the curry powder. Make into croquettes, using a raw egg to bind them together, dip in beaten egg, then in crumbs and fry in deep fat.

**Old Fashioned Chicken Sandwiches.**—Use white homemade bread, butter it with sweet butter when thinly sliced, then cover each slice with cold chicken shredded in strips with the fingers. Add a dust of salt and black pepper and a light sprinkle of dry mustard. Cover the slices and then cut them through with a sharp knife into two narrow strips. Pickled gherkins or olives are often served at simple wedding feasts with meat sandwiches of any sort.

**Shrimp Stew.**—To each can of shrimp, carefully picked over, use a pint of milk, speck pepper, rounding teaspoonful of butter, salt to taste. Heat milk in a double boiler, thicken slightly with a level teaspoonful of flour, add shrimp, allow them to heat through, add pepper, butter and either some of the shrimp liquor or salt to taste and serve with oyster crackers.
