Hamilton, who is a student in commerce at the college, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Hamilton of this city and a graduate of the local high school. He has been a participant in journalistic activities on the Corvallis campus for the past two years. Last year he was elected editor of the Orange Owl, Oregon State College humor magazine, and has served as night editor of the Daily Barometer for several months. He was awarded the "efficiency" prize last month for editing the best newspaper of the term.
