### SYLVANITE MINE HAS 13 MEN ON PAYROLL NOW

The Sylvanite mine is again being developed. For the past several months there have been a few men employed there mucking out the old tunnels and building a power line and sundry other duties incumbent upon its opening.

The power was cut in a few weeks ago, the new compressor set up and the air lines laid into the tunnel. Now a crew of thirteen men working in two shifts are on the payroll. The old workings had some six hundred feet of tunnel and other work already done and the new management expects, according to Superintendent Haff to drive about seven hundred more feet of tunnel and then raise as well as to go down on a vein at the end of the present tunnel. As fast as the tunnel is built tracks are provided upon which to move the rock to the dump. The track is so graded that a gradual slope is maintained from the rear of the tunnel to the dump and yet not steep enough but what one man can easily return the car to the workings. The miners, up until last week end were mining by the use of the old carbide miners lights but George Hammersly, acting as electrician has equipped the tunnel with electric lights which will greatly facilitate work. Henry Ray and Homer Wyatt are operating the drills on the day shift assisted at times by John Mardon Jr. and Geo. Hammersly while Geo. Haff is general supervisor of all the work. John Mardon Sr. presides at the forge and is assisted in that department by Ray Thompson. Mr. Mardon has long held the reputation of being one of the best drill sharpeners in the game and since the retirement of Perry Knotts to less menial labors his claim is apparently unchallenged. Mr. Messenger is in charge of the compressor on the day shift while Mr. Jackson is in charge at nights. Ed Wyatt LeRoy Cameron Mr. Clemens and Mr. Hauskins make up the rest of the night force.

At the present time the crew are working on a winz which is following down a rich but narrow vein to ascertain what it will develop into. The main tunnel is being run toward the top of the mountain to tap a large vein which exists there and which will be the principal pay streak of the mine. When this vein is tapped the com-

pany expects to be underneath so as to make the mining as easy as possible and so located that it can be brought out on a gravity system thus eliminating much expense of operation.

Everyone in this vicinity is expecting big things at the Sylvanite and all hope for its success. With one good mine near the city it will furnish incentive for other developments.
