By the very narrow margin of one vote the people of the district voted down the proposal to transport the students from the outlying portions of the district to the school during the term. The sentiment of the towns people seemed to be against the transportation while the out-

side residents were in favor. A good portion of the schools of the county furnish bus transportation to the country children thereby eliminating so many individual trips to the school each day by the people who send their children in to the city schools. It was hoped by many that the Central Point district would see fit to also furnish transportation but those in favor were not strong enough at the final show down. It is quite probable however that within another year the transportation will be afforded as the close vote this year will undoubtedly add interest to a similar vote should it be called for next year.

### PARASITE IS KILLING MANY FISH IN ELK LAKE NEAR BEND

A small worm has taken a heavy toll of fish in Elk Lake, near Bend and caused the state game commission to close the lake to fishermen. This is the first time in the history of the commission that such a worm has been discovered. According to Matt Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries, who has made an investigation, the worm is about one-half

inch in length and attacks the internal organs of trout causing death. Many fish have been found upon the shores of the lake and the commission has collected and burned them. Every possible effort will be made to keep the parasite from spreading to other lakes and streams.
