SPECIAL SCHOOL MEETING

WILL BE HELD TONIGHT

A special school meeting will be held this evening, Friday September 13th at the high school building for the purpose of voting upon the matter of transportation of pupils residing over 1½ miles from the school. The same question came to a vote a short time ago and was defeated by one vote. It appears that the people living within the district who will not be accorded transportation do not favor transportation while those on the outside are willing to spend the extra money to save themselves the worry and added expense of conveying their children to and from school. It is estimated that the transportation of the pupils will require an annual expenditure of \$3500 and those who live in the city and who are opposing the project claim that the money can well be spent for more useful purposes.

Only those who are property holders and tax payers in the district will be allowed to vote, this time.
