## MULCH PAPER AND MILCH COWS



THERE were two Irishmen, one a farmer and one a postmaster, both of whom had a rogue you could cut with a spade. One day the farmer came into the postoffice and inquired: "Have you a letter for Mike Howe?" "No," said the postmaster indignantly, "of course I've no letter for your cow."

### Zut What About Mulch?

All of this may seem far removed from mulch paper, but it really isn't. You see, not so far in the future Mike Howe's cow may be eating a new food made possible only by this durable tar paper which the pineapple growers in Hawaii use to help the crop grow.

For miles and miles in Hawaii during the planting season, machines will be seen laying strips of black paper along the dark red ground. Workers follow the machine, punching holes in the paper and inserting the pineapple slips. During the growing season the paper repels the efforts of weeds and conserves the precious soil moisture.

### Pineapple Versus Sunflower

What has this, again, to do with cows? Well, when the pineapples are sliced for canning there is a by-product called pineapple pulp or bran. It consists of the cores and outer coats.

For a long time no one knew what to do with these until someone got busy and made a chemical analysis of them. "I believe this would be good food for cattle," he said. So the bran was prepared, and tests have recently been made of it by the Washington State College Agricultural Experiment Station.

For twenty days sweet-breathed Jerseys and Holsteins were given their regular feed consisting of alfalfa hay, grain mixture, and sunflower silage. Then the pineapple bran was substituted for the sunflower silage.

### From Wonder to Enthusiasm

At first the cows showed a tendency to sniff dubiously at the exotic pineapple bran, but after a few days they got decidedly enthusiastic, and in a short time they would almost moo their delight when the new food was put in their mangers.

It all goes to show that cows have their feelings just as people do. Who will forget the first time he ate an olive? Then contrast it with one's present attitude towards that delicacy. More people all the time are eating pineapple, and perhaps the time will come when milch cows will be broken hearted if the daily ration fails to contain a few pounds of the food that has been made possible by mulch paper.

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## Cranberries All the Year



CRANBERRIES are not simply an autumn food which can be bought only at Thanksgiving time. To be sure, fresh cranberries are limited in point of time, but did you know that cranberries are commercially canned as jelly or sauce, so you can have them any time of the year? Cranberry jelly, just as it comes from the can, is a real conserve ready to use with game or fowl. Cranberries in either of these forms save the housewife from all the drudgery of picking over and washing them, boiling them, and for the jelly, rubbing them through a sieve.

### Tart, but Sweet

The cranberry is one of the few fruits which has a fresh, delicious flavor and yet has a suggestion of

tartness about it which makes it welcome in desserts and salads which might otherwise be too sweet. Cranberry ice, molded cranberry salad, and many other cranberry dishes may be made. Here is the way to make:

**Cranberry Jelly Salad:** Heat one can of cranberry jelly with one-half cup orange juice and two table-spoons lemon juice. Soak four table-spoons of gelatin in two table-spoons cold water and then dissolve in the hot, melted cranberry. Strain and cool. Add one-fourth cup diced celery and one-fourth cup chopped nuts when beginning to stiffen. Pour into molds wet with cold water, and chill. Turn onto lettuce leaves, and serve with celery hearts stuffed with cream cheese.
