Sardines on Toast.....	17
Italian Macaroni.....	33
Dressed Lettuce.....	10
French Bread and Butter.....	12
Fruit Cup with Cheese Crackers.....	23

Sardines on Toast: Heat the contents of one can of sardines in their oil; drain and arrange on four small squares of toast which have been

lightly buttered. Garnish with a lemon wedge.

Italian Macaroni: Boil two-thirds of a nine-ounce package of macaroni until tender. Drain and pour over the macaroni the following sauce: cook one-fourth pound of hamburger steak in one tablespoon olive oil until tender, stirring constantly with a fork to keep it finely divided. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add three-fourths cup strained tomatoes (pressed from a ten-ounce can) and one-half of a six-ounce can of tomato paste. Season again to taste, and cook very gently for thirty minutes or longer.

Fruit Cup with Cheese Crackers: Open two eight-ounce cans of fruits for salad and arrange in dessert or cocktail glasses. Chill for a long time. Serve with cheese crackers.
